I must stress that there is no obligation on any group of ex-Apexians to become a financial member of Apex 40, which is the National body of Past Apexians Groups that is officially recognised by Apex. However, for those groups who wish to be a part of Apex 40, it does cost money to produce this Newsletter and to distribute copies to all branches (and some members at large), plus a modest amount for administration. The annual Affiliation Fee for each branch is equivalent to \$1.00 per address, whether a couple or a single member, to a maximum of \$50 for any branch. Of 50 branches, only 22 have registered for this year.

The advantages to be gained from Apex 40 are perhaps primarily the opportunity to attend the Annual Rort, and also to keep up to date with happenings from other branches. Most of us, I'm sure, will agree that one of the greatest features of Apex 40 is the opportunity to make friends with other past-Apexians and their ladies, both locally and interstate.
