The following are excerpts from Reports by the out-going National Executive to the Annual General Meeting in Perth

"What does worry me is our source of membership growth, the recent Apex retirees are diminishing in numbers and our future growth rate may not match that of the last couple of years. One argument I often hear when talking to people about Apex 40 is the perception that we lack a purpose, that to be just a social club is not enough.

We know that for those of us here it is enough, that the ties of fellowship that bind us together go back so far they will hold for a long time to come. We also know that what surplus funds are generated do go back to an Apex project. Perhaps all we need to do is to identify ourselves more closely with a high-profile charity and put a little more effort into our fund-raising capability

I believe we will place ourselves in a stronger position for future growth if we address these two problem areas as outlined in the previous paragraph in the

following manner:

1 — Appoint a State Co-ordinator to assist in growth and extension in States other than that of the National Extension Officer. (So we would have six State Co-ordinators plus one National)

2 — Adopt a major charity as our fund-raising objective. I would recommend the Apex Foundation as being ideal."

These clubs are not financial and I wonder if we should still persist in remaining in contact if they do not show some interest in us.

Financially we are in an excellent position, with a very healthy bank balance of

some seventeen hundred dollars. This is without doubt due to the substantial donation from Grafton and the increase in Club affiliations. Imagine the balance if all Clubs paid.

a Jazz Night on Saturday and a 21st Birthday Masked Ball on the Sunday.

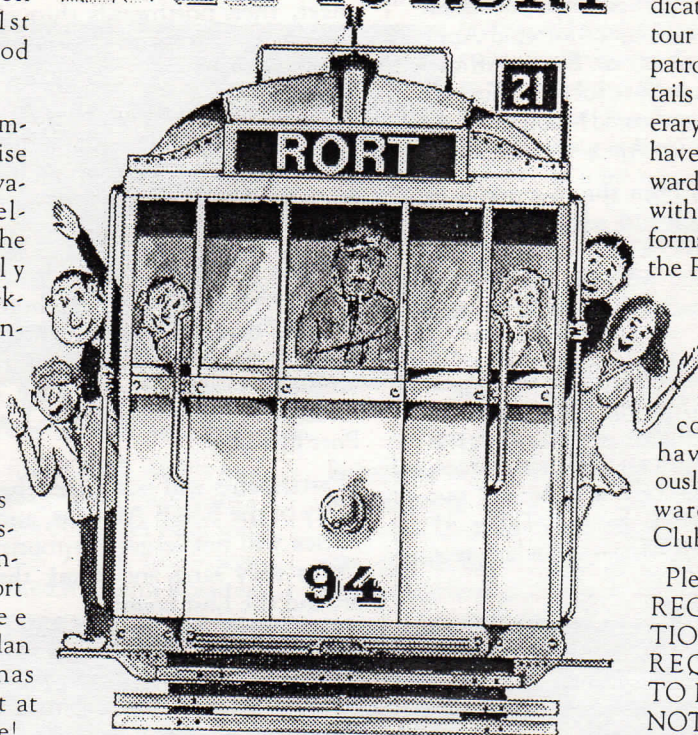

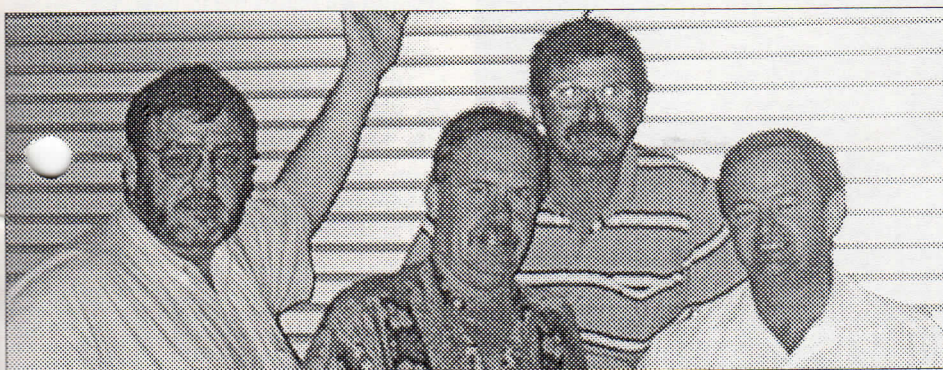

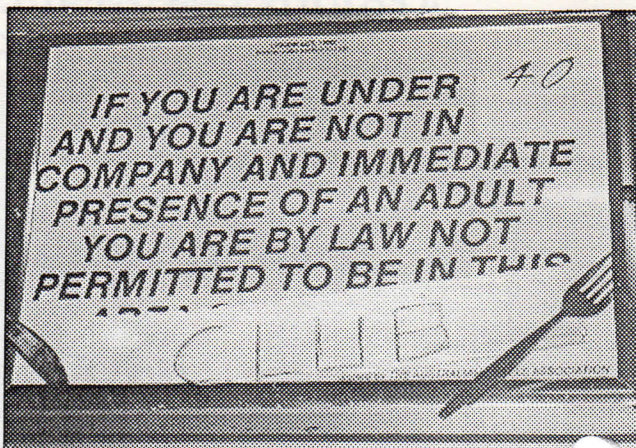

At our JULY meeting we will have a discussion on dropping the Old Boy name, changing to Apex 40 Dubbo and including wives as members.

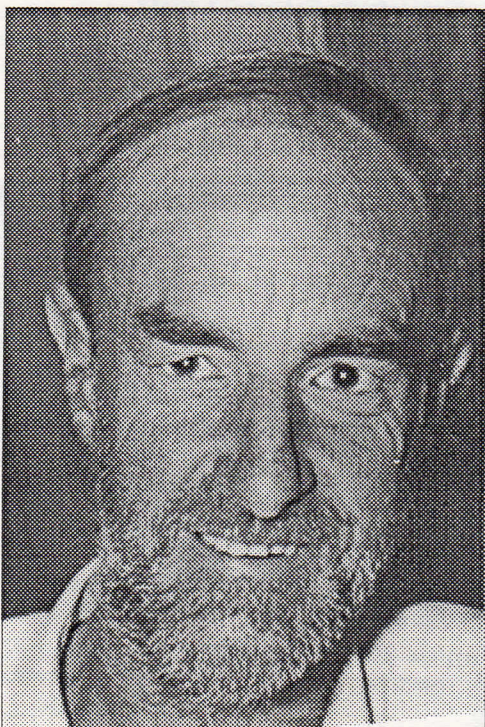

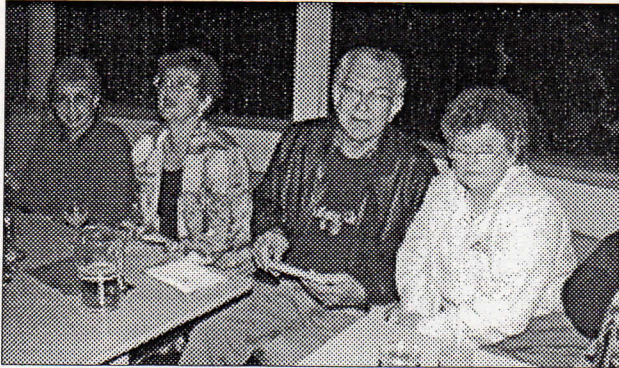

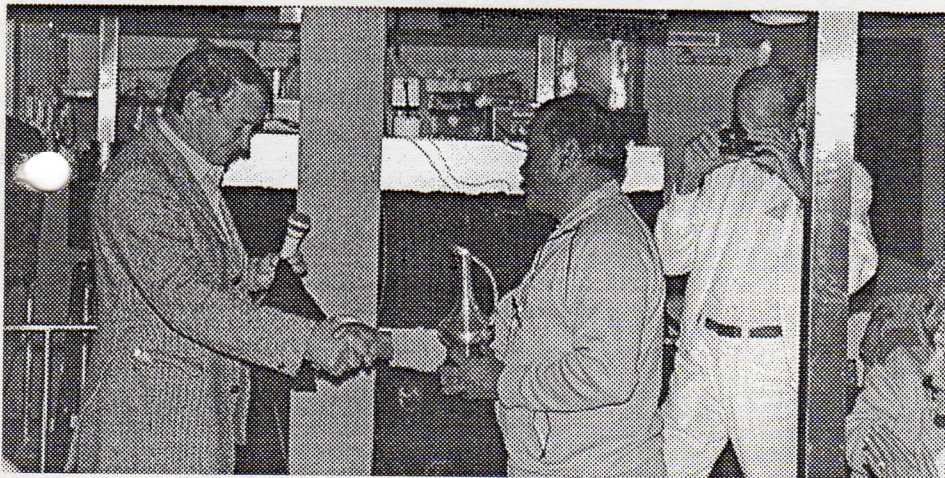
until 10.30 p.m. when we arrived giddy, well fed and (some members at least) well sozzled at Perth.

APEX/SAFEGARD

THEFT DETERRENT & RECOVERY SYSTEM

On 4 December 1992 the National Board of the association of Apex Clubs of Australia ratified an agreement & formal contract between the Association & Safegard Pty. Limited in regard to the marketing of the Safegard Theft Deterrent & Recovery System developed by that company over the previous two years. It was agreed that the product would be marketed as a joint venture product benefiting Apex at Club and National level.

Safegard developed this unique marking system in a positive attempt to make possible the rapid identification of stolen property, including motor vehicles and pleasure boats. In recent years 'Community Policing' and 'Neighbourhood Watch' have helped to slow the incidence in theft of easily disposable items from both private homes and commercial premises, however, theft continues to increase and to year ended 30 June last rose by 16% nationally. Police until now have had great difficulty in establishing ownership of recovered stolen property, and because of this, return of property has been difficult. Similarly, insurance companies frequently experience difficulty in proving ownership by a policy holder. Safegard intends to greatly reduce these difficulties by the acceptance of the Safegard system. The system involves the marking of with an exclusive aluminium disc, details are then recorded on the Safegard computer database and in turn made accessible to police and insurance companies on a toll free fax number 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Theft DETERRENT is the big plus of this product!

Safegard's unique identification system offers the added benefit that personal family heirlooms or treasured valuables unable to be replaced through insurance claims, can be identified by the Police and returned to their rightful owner.

10 Security discs, 4 Warning stickers, Registration form and Instruction sheet, Transfer of ownership form and return envelope

Annual renewals are set at	\$35.00 per annum for all the above.
Income to Apex: Each Apex/Safeguard pack sold by a Club will generate \$10.00 income to the club.

Apex veteran laments falling membership

A healthy spirit of fun and community service must be growing on the Sunshine Coast with the recent election of two locals to the positions of national president and secretary of Apex 40.

It is the first time a Queenslander has been elected president of Apex 40, the club set up for retired members of the community service club Apex.

Glenn "Chook" Rossiter, of the Caloundra branch, is the new president and Andrew James, of Maroochydore branch, the new secretary. They were elected at the annual

"Rort" in Perth last month. Mr Rossiter, a builder, said because Apex 40 was strictly social there was little he had to do in his new role apart from putting together a newsletter and keeping the clubs coordinated. But he said he was concerned about the falling membership of Apex.

"People are too bloody lazy to get into it," he said.

Mr Rossiter joined in 1972 when he was 27 and said helping the community and becoming involved in speech making and other activities led to self betterment.
