



This year it is great to have a Rort hosted by a relatively new club, and special thanks must go to Chairperson Marian Clark, Secretary Niel Nielson and their band of willing helpers. A total registration of just on 155, with 18 clubs in attendance together with some "at large" members – WEL-COME ALL.

Your National Executive Team have reported in this Annual Report, and thanks must go to Brian, Glenn, Kevin and the Two Alans for their support and contribution. Internationally we are starting to get known via N.Z. 41 and Kin 40, and a special thanks to Kevin Huxham for his effort. In an organisation the size of ours communication is an important aspect, and payment of your per capitas is a necessary evil if we are to maintain that contact (NB - maximum fee is \$50 per club and hasn't changed in 12 years). These per capitas not only cover day to day running but also purchase of Stick pins, Name Badges, Apex 40 Banners, Car stickers, pamphlets on Apex 40 and Copies of Constitution, all of which are available from your Executive let them know what you need. Apex 40 is the only recognised Past Apexians group by Apex, and we pay them 10% of our per capitas for the use of our symbol. During the past several years we have maintained a good rapport with their Executive and the Apex Foundation.

Remember our aim is to assist Apex when called upon and to continue the fellowship formed in Apex.

Our Editor and his team have spent considerable time compiling the newsletter, with the aim being that it is passed on to all members. (Note – cost precludes us from sending a copy for all members, the latest Roaring 40's 'cost of production' at around \$280 has not been included in annual accounts).

While contact with the Apex National Executive was initially difficult, no doubt caused by their move to South Australia, we have been successful in contacting Executive Director Andrew Phillip, and hope that we can now keep our lines of communication open, and even improve on them.


INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS REPORT

N.Z. 41 Tour Europe

Round Table 41 New Zealand has tour departing N.Z. July 30, which is both home hosted and hotels through Singapore to Greece, Italy, Turkey, Rhodes, Cypress, Israel and Egypt; returning to N.Z. September 16. Cost is N.Z. \$10,450 per person.

A week stopover in the Hawaiian Islands on the way home will give the required rest for participants. The tour will be home hosted and hotels. More details as they come to hand.

Springvale, Vic.


Grovedale, Vic. Redcliffe, Old (re-formed)


POST RORT TRIP – A GREAT SUCCESS!

Well, only 15 of us ventured out to explore the Hunter Valley, Western Plains and the Blue Mountains after a great Rort, and we were ably looked after by our hosts Marian & Malcolm Clark, and by our bus driver Stephen, who turned out to be most obliging and helpful.

We left Wyong behind, where they had six inches of rain in as many days after we left, and headed first to have a look at the Munmorah Power Station, situated on the edge of Lake Munmorah. Here Malcolm showed us

around the vast complex, and into it's hub, to see how a power station works and competes in the open market. Onwards to the popular "Wyndham Estate" winery for a lunch of home made soup and bread, while enjoying a wine tasting; also for some of us, a stocking up of supplies which were depleted during the next few days.

Our first night was spent at the Bridgecourt Motor inn in Muswell-brook, where we started a practise, which continued each night, of getting together after tea for a port and a fines session, the funds of which were used towards our last night celebration.

The second day we headed for Dubbo, and travelled via various back roads through the quaint townships of

Denman, Sandy Hollow and Merriwa. Here we had our usual morning tea break, where our bus driver Stephen, as usual, set out tea and biscuits whilst we all walked around for a break. Our journey continued on to Gulgong, the town pictured on the old ten dollar note, and which also boasts an extensive Museum of the area's past - old horse carts, harvesters, clothing, books, photos, buildings, and an old bank, as well as antique nicknacks used in the old days. After lunch, which for some of us was a good old fashioned pie with real steak and kidney, we headed for the City of Dubbo and a two night stay at the Blue Lagoon Motor Inn, and a rest up for our next day.

Our third day was devoted to 'let's

look at Dubbo', with our first stop being Dubbo's Western Plains Zoo, which is Australia's only official open range 200. Here we could see all the animals roaming freely around on 280 hectares of parkland, and witnessed a spectacular display by some apes as they swung on their ropes, filling the Park with echoes of their calls. There wasn't much we didn't see, so naturally this took time. Some of us walked, and some of us got on and off the bus as it slowly travelled round and waited for us at every stop. We lunched amongst the birds (feathered kind), including a small rest before we headed off. Next stop was the Old Dubbo Goal, which was closed as a penal institution in 1966 and therefore was in very good order. We saw huge sandstone walls which are a stark reminder. of our harsh and often violent past, as well the gallows, and a visual and audio display in each of the important rooms, where a prisoner related his experiences of the past and what he was in goal for.

That night back at our motel, we had tea with Apex Foundation Member and Apexian Tony Peters, who has since organised that National President Garth will talk at the Apex National Convention at Albury in mid July – our communications are certainly improving with Apex.

Our fourth day saw us venture into the townships of Wellington and Molong, then onto Bathurst, where we went for a drive around the Mt Panorama circuit, which is not as wide as it looks on T.V., is certainly much steeper than we thought, and has houses right on the circuit. After a look around Bathurst and lunch, we were off again, and this time bound for Katoomba in the Blue Mountains. A very steep and windy road, with some marvellous views when we could see through the mist and very low cloud. A trip, for those who were game, on the Scenic Railway and Skyway (cable car) enabled us to catch a glimpse of the Three Sisters despite the heavy cloud. We did, however, catch up with the Rossiter's from Caloundra and the Richardson's from Devonport, and briefly renew old acquaintances. That night we stayed in Blackheath, not far from the Three Sisters, at the High Mountains Motor Inn, and for the first time the entire bus load used their electric blankets to warm up, for it was a very cold and overcast night.

Our fifth day was spent mainly in getting to, and at, the Jenolan Caves. On our way there the clouds were very low and we couldn't see a thing, except an odd mountain peaking through the cloud. There were nine caves available for viewing, we all went through the biggest one, and some of us went back a second time to a smaller cave with an underground river, very interesting, and different from most caves because of the size. By the time we were on our way back the clouds had gone, and we were able

to see the beautiful country side. Next we stopped briefly at Hartley to see the old Court House and village, and then back to Blackheath for a look at Govetts Leap, where a horseman was supposed to have jumped to his death; again, it was real grandeur, with some spectacular views.

On our final day we headed first for the famous Zig Zag Railway at Lithgow, with its formation of two tunnels, three beautiful sandstone viaducts and many man made ledges hewn into the mountainside, and internationally acclaimed as one of the great engineering wonders of the 19th century. After our ride on the Zig Zag, we travelled down the Bells Line of Road through Bilpin, Kurrajong and into the Richmond and Windsor areas before reaching the freeway and heading back to Wyong to say goodbye to our friends of the past six days. The 'Wyong Mob' again turned on their hospitality for some of us that night, as we said a final farewell to those who had done so much towards such an excellent Rort.

While our Bus trip was small in numbers, it was agreed by all that we got to know each other a lot better and had a great time – thanks to Marian and Malcolm, and Stephen the bus driver. Prepared by your semi-official 'part-time' Post Rort Reporter.

VALE - ERN BUTLER.



In the last issue of "Roaring 40's" we recalled that Ern Butler (Melbourne-Gippsland) was the inaugural winner of the Whizzy trophy.

Sadly, we have now to report that Ern passed away on 30th May after a long battle with myeloma, cancer of the bone marrow.

Ern grew up in Redcliffs near Mildura in Victoria and joined Apex there. When he transferred to Melbourne in his job in the timber and building supplies industry, he joined Nunawading Apex Club where he served as President and was awarded Life Membership.

He played a large part in formation of the Nunawading and District Retarded and Spastic Childrens' Association (NADRASCA) and served as a member of the governing body of NADAVOC, the associated sheltered workshop. During his time in Apex, and subsequently, Ern attended a number of WOCO conferences and led a number of tours of Apexians to overseas venues. He was known for his ready wit and his many colourful accounts of events and mishaps during his travels.

One of the early members of Apex 40 following its commencement in 1973, Ern served as National President of Apex 40 from 1981 to 1983.

Ern endured considerable pain during his final months which he faced with fortitude and was still able to keep his sense of humour. He will be sadly missed by all who knew him.

Wherever he has gone to, we know that Ern will "take the slack out of 'em".




"The Pirate King", alias Peter Ryall, in full pirate regalia at Friday night's reception at Warners Lodge.


