

Wyong is not far away, I hope to see as many of you as possible in Wyong RORTing it up at the Nauti RORT.



NEW HOME FOR APEX

The National Office of Apex Australia, and all its related entities, is now in Nuriootpa in the Barossa Valley. In early 1995 the Trustee of several properties in the Barossa Valley donated to the community by the Coulthard family, offered a building, the old Coulthard home, to the Barossa Valley Apex Club. As a result, negotiations were commenced between the club, the Trustees and Apex National President Shane Kelly.

With diminishing numbers and associated financial pressures in recent years, and considering that over 90 percent of Apex members were located outside metropolitan areas, there had been a lot of discussion about the feasibility of one day looking to relocate somewhere other than Sydney.

Coulthard House (pictured) is a most impressive State Heritage listed building. it was completed in 1858 and remained in the Coulthard family until being donated to the community. Apex has become the tenant of the current Trustees on extremely favourable terms, with a long-term lease and nominal rent.



An official opening ceremony took place on 10 March as part of Apex's 65th birthday celebrations. Apex members and their families are encouraged to visit the National Office and we assume that Apex 40 members would also be welcome to see over this interesting building in one of the prime tourist areas of Australia. 

Garth isn't a beer drinker but enjoys red and white wines and especially a glass of port after a meal.








A BUMPER WAY TO SPREAD THE WORD ABOUT THE APEX FOUNDATION!
