Marian's comments on the Philippines: "It's interesting, and it's bloody hot here this time of year." At least she has the consolation of knowing that this is as hot as it gets. Perhaps we can get a few lines from her.

Marian – "Not to mention the traffic! You all thought traffic was bad in Australia, well to me they look like the most polite drivers in the world after a week here. The people here are very friendly and curious about where we are from and think we are rich tourists, that's a joke!

I too am maintaining community action as I have been inducted as a member of the Inner Wheel Club of Cebu South. I don't actually remember agreeing to it, they just seemed to take it for granted and don't take "no" for an answer. We have been on a couple of medical missions that provide free health care for the poor people of Cebu and they are something different to the average health care in Oz. The medical teams take out doctors, nurses, dentists, a pharmacist and even

a vet (rabies is a problem here) to do minor surgery and medical treatments in the local school classrooms. There are lots of people attending, particularly young children, so it seems to work for them. For lunch we had roast lechon (pig) and we drank coconut milk through a straw straight from the coconut, it was very sweet and tasty.

We are looking forward to coming back for the Rort in 1999, especially to good old Aussie food and I am sure the weekend will be a lot of fun as usual."

PS She likes the beach resorts.

I am communicating with the Malaysian clubs via email and hope I will have been there before the Rort. Apart from that I am only getting news from Wyong Apex 40. Our operations continue thanks to the efforts of our Secretary/Treasurer, National Committee and the two Alans working on the newsletter.

The Rotarians amongst you will be pleased to know that my community spirit has not waned with my stay in Cebu; I have joined the Rotary Club of Cebu South.

I met a Rotarian from Canada who comes from Cebu and advised him of Kevin Huxham's work organising our trip to Canada in 1999; we're still hoping to join the tour. Anyway, just out of interest this guy, Noni, is involved in Rotary international hosting. So we may enrol for that. Apex 40 first of course!

The tour is very close to finalisation and will depart August 8, 1999, returning September 4, 1999; a tour of 27 days. The tour is for Apex 40 members only because we are home hosted by K-40 members, the equivalent of Apex 40 throughout Canada.

23 Coach tour to Edmonton, site of the world's biggest shopping centre, home hosted

27 Coach tour from Calgary to Banff and Lake Louise in the Canadian Rockies and on to Jasper. Hotel accommodation

28 Coach tour to Wells Gray Park for lunch, then on to Kamloops, home hosted

30 Coach tour to Kelowna in the Okanagan Valley, home hosted

31 Kelowna tours, wineries, home hosted

Sept 1 Coach tour back to Vancouver, farewell party. Hotel accomodation

2 Flight back to Australia, arriving September 4 (date-line loss), or take side tours. Included in the tour will be air fares, travel insurance, coach tours, transfers, all taxes, hotel accomodation (three or four nights), some but not all meals, a tour jacket & golf shirt, and a gift for each hosting or participating K-40 Club. The exact final fare will depend on currency fluctuations and airfare changes.

Cost is on a twin share basis and will be \$3,150 per person, in addition to the level of cabin selected on the cruise to Alaska, which range from \$1,712 to \$3,423. Bookings will be on a first in, best dressed basis as far as available cabins are concerned. A non-refundable deposit of \$700 per person will secure a place on the tour, which will be limited to 44 participants. VALE - APEX LIFE GOVERNOR ROSS McLEOD



Ross passed away at home on September 13, 1998 at age 56; he was not only the best known Apexian during the last thirty years or so, but also one of the hardest workers.

Ross was well known throughout Australia when he was employed in the administrative position of Apex as Executive Director from 1975 to 1985, and the National Office has never been managed better than during his term. He was fondly known as Mr. Apex.

Ross was a member of Lane Cove Apex Club and his commitment to every facet of Apex was always 100%; he will be remembered for his dry humour, integrity and ability to make other people want to work with him.

His commitment to Apex and the community was continuous, and some of the

organisations to benefit from his skills were: Chatswood Community Help Support Scheme (20 years as a committee member), National Chairman of Quest of Quests, N.S.W. Multiple Sclerosis Society, Open Heart Association of Australia, local football association, local basketball association. Neighbourhood Watch Committee. and the local schools that his five children attended. Perhaps the best way to describe Ross' acceptance of the ideals of Apex and his dedication to the Association, is by recording the fact that in 1982 he was honoured by being granted the 38th Life Governorship of Apex, at that time some 300,000 members had passed through our membership and nobody deserved it more.

With the amount of time Ross devoted to Apex, the fact that he was still able to enjoy his family to the extent that he did is a great credit to him, and let there be no doubt that Ross McLeod was a dedicated family man, who always enjoyed the complete support of wife Maree and his children.

Ross will always be remembered by everyone who knew him. His funeral was attended by over 500 people, including several Apex Life Governors and many old Apex friends.

For those who ever travelled by car with Ross driving, it would seem like a really fitting finale when the cortege was escorted by a police radar-equipped highway patrol car to his final resting place. Tom Dumpleton, Wyong Apex 40


KUALA LUMPUR: August meeting


Perhaps you guys can visit us, not necessarily during club functions, to keep the fellowship on a sound footing.



The contribution by Apex Clubs to the many communities that it serves, at a local, regional, State and National level, are as a direct result of the foresight of these three men during the Great Depression in 1931."

Mr. Neville also confirmed that "Sir John Buchan had continued to make an incredible contribution to the direction of the public service undertaken by Apex Clubs, at all levels, right up until his death!"

The Association of Apex Clubs of Australia also confirmed that not only had Sir John been partially responsible for the commencement of this icon in Australian community service, he had also served the community as a Melbourne City Councillor and through service to the Liberal Party.

Mr. Neville also said that "Sir John will be sadly missed, but his Apex Club legacy must live on."
