The highlight of the past term would have to be the forthcoming tour as guests of K-40 Clubs of Canada which will depart Australia on August 8 for a period of 27 days.

It will take in a week long cruise to Alaska staying in three ports of Ketchikan, Juneau and Skagway after the first couple of days on Vancouver Island.

We then meander our way both by train and coach through the provinces of British Columbia and Alberta, taking in the many glorious sights of the Canadian Rockies along with other scenery.

The tour is almost all home hosted by our counterpart organisation K-40 ("over the hill" members of Kinsmen Clubs of Canada) except for about five nights.

The beauty of this type of tour is that you live with real Canadian hosts in their home, rather than going from hotel to hotel and only mixing with tourists.

Tri-Nations Rort - 2000

The Moree Rort in 2000 should see a number of overseas visitors in the form of Round Table 41'ers from New Zealand and South Africa in attendance. This is being organised by Derek Clarke from South Africa who has tried to persuade New Zealand members to

transfer their conference to Moree.

It has always been a dream of mine that we could transfer our Rort to coincide with New Zealand's Conference and add in about 10 days of home hosting whilst visiting their beautiful country. For them to reciprocate and have maximum numbers in attendance, we would need to have our Rort (in the year they come back) along or not too far inland from the east coastline.

If there were no nominations for 2001, perhaps this would be the opportune time to put this idea into action. Food for thought.







RORT REPORT

We Wined, Dined and Mined at the Bendigo Rort. As they have done on two previous occasions, Bendigo Apex 40 turned on a Rort to be remembered.

The All Seasons Motel was the centre of activities and the venue for the Welcome Social on Friday evening. During the evening the Mayor of the City of Greater Bendigo welcomed all Rorters and wished them well for the weekend. Moree members, prominently arrayed in distinctive caps and shirts of locally grown cotton, took the opportunity to promote their forthcoming Moree Rort Two Double Nought with a video display and handouts describing the tourist highlights of Moree and the Newell Highway. 'Sticker Man', Mark Tramby, kept busy sticking stickers on anyone or any thing that moved exhorting us to "Get With The Push - Come To The Bush" at the Moree Rort Two Double Nought. As usual, it was a time for catching up with friends we haven't seen since last year.

On Saturday morning we were taken to Central Deborah Gold Mine where

most of us went 60 metres underground in our safety helmets and miners' lamps but no-one managed to bring up any gold. Then it was off on the talking tram, past many of the City's impressive architectural gems of last century and on to the Tramways Museum with its wonderful collection of trams from the past. The lawn area and gardens in front of the grandstand at the Bendigo racecourse provided an attractive venue for lunch. After lunch we visited the Chinese Museum with its colourful displays of the history of the Chinese population in the gold-rush days. The major item in the museum is the 300 metre long dragon, Sun Loong - the largest of









For dinner that night we dined Chinese style at the Imperial Palace restaurant.

On Tuesday we travelled to Echuca, stopping along the way at Elmore to visit the new H.V.McKay museum which highlights the achievements of the designer of the famous Sunshine Combine Harvester. At Echuca we took a cruise along the Murray River on the paddle steamer Canberra and enjoyed a buffet lunch on board. In the afternoon we had time to look around the historic Port of Echuca before heading for Bickley's Barn

for a very nice dinner in an unusual setting and the opportunity for some dancing and a fines session. On the road out to Bickleys we passed John Farnham's extremely prosperous looking country estate where he breeds stock horses.

Wednesday saw us off to Lockwood where we visited a mohair farm where they spin not only mohair yarn but also yarns from alpacca, camel and possum! Next we had a guided tour of the National Trust classified, historic residence 'Buda', the one time home of the Leviny family, where we had afternoon tea and a wander around the extensive garden. Dinner that night was at the Egion Greek Tavern back in Bendigo where we enjoyed a sumptuous banquet and learnt a little of Greek dancing, Zorba style, from the proprietress.

Thursday was wine tasting day! First, the McIvor Creek winery where we also had morning tea and then on to Chateau Tahbilk at Nagambie where we were taken on a tour of the historic cellars. Next, the Mitchelton winery beside the Goulburn River where we had a delightful lunch in their restaurant, washed down with some of the local produce. That night we stayed home for a barbecue dinner in the new swimming pool complex at the All Seasons.

On Friday morning we were taken on a very informative and interesting walking tour of the Victoria Hill gold dig-

gings at Bendigo by guide/historian, James Lerk, then across the road to the Gold Mines hotel for a much better than normal pub lunch. After lunch we paid a visit to the Bendigo Art Gallery where we were welcomed by the President of the gallery, ex-Apexian John Higgs. A special exhibition on display was a collection of Opera costumes. Our last night together was spent with dinner at Pratty's Patch, an interesting old hotel at Maiden Gully where they serve the biggest rib-eye steaks you could possibly imagine! And they served a nice 'milk shake'!

It was a great week, in the company of good friends including a number of Bendigo members who joined us on the tours, and we were kept entertained by our jovial bus driver Ken who only managed to get us lost a couple of times. An exciting program has been prepared for the Year 2000 Rort to be hosted by Moree (NSW) Apex 40 and for a Post-Rort tour around out-back NSW. The Rort will be held over the weekend of 12 -15 May with the option of a 3 night/4 day tour to follow.
