


We arrived in Vancouver on 8th August; 16 from NSW, 13 Queenslanders, 11 Tasmanians, 10 Victorians, and two from SA. Pleased to find Canadian beer was drinkable. We were driven into Vancouver and shown its main attractions with markets on Granville Island and the beautiful har-

bour with great floating piles of logs on the way to the various mills.

On the 10th we went by coach and ferry to Vancouver Island where we toured Victoria and were home hosted by a fellow named "Pepper", and his wife Gail, who promptly took Alma and myself on a pub crawl of the island apparently he thinks we Aussies like our beer. I didn't let the team down. After breakfast we were dropped off at our coach for a tour of the famous Butchart Gardens, an old 50 acre quarry converted by the one family into a magnificent series of gardens complete with



Bakerville, a historic mining town, where Kevin Huxham took part in a stage play and was given the title of Chief Poopah of Bakerville.




Next day we visited West Edmonton Shopping Mall, the biggest in the



September 1 – Coached back to Vancouver where we enjoyed a farewell party with a number of our hosts in preparation for the flight back to OZ on September 2.


Thanks to our tour leaders Kevin and Liz Huxham for their efforts in organising and guiding us, and to Gary Soles for the Canadian section of the tour.

VALE: EWEN LAIRD.C.B.E.

n Sunday 18 July the last surviving Founder of Apex, Ewen Laird, died after a long illness. Ewen was aged 92.

At a public memorial service held in Newtown, Geelong on 23 July eulogies were delivered by friends of Ewen and his family. The following are excerpts from a eulogy delivered by past Geelong Apex member Bruce Adams on Ewen's "community service life" which was published in the Spring 1999 edition of The Apexian.

"Most of you will be aware that Apex started here in Geelong in 1931. The Founders were three young men; John Buchan, Langham Proud and Ewen Laird, architects who worked together in the same office and were of the same opinion that something had to be done to lift young men out of the prevailing spirit of hopelessness that the Great Depression of the '30's had brought about.

The new Club was first called the Young Business Men's Club, but in March 1931 the name "Apex" was adopted, with a badge designed by Ewen Laird, having three equal sides representing fellowship and service, resting on a base of citizenship. In two months the fundamental direction of the Club had been thrashed out, a constitution adopted and officers elected.

The Apex movement quickly spread - initially with a lot of help from Rotary, then through

the efforts of each Club. By the onset of World War II there were 1500 members in 40 Clubs, organised into a national body. Apex survived the war years, although most Clubs lost up to half their number to the services but, with the cessation of hostilities, numbers quickly grew with 100 Clubs by 1955, 500 in 1967, and a staggering 800 Clubs with 17,000 members in 1979.

Ewen continued to put the Ideals of Apex into practice for the rest of his life. As well as his on-going support for Apex, he joined Rotary, was President of the Geelong Rotary Club in 1973-74, was awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship in 1987, and was an enthu-

siastic Rotarian up until three or four months before his death.

Other community involvements that Ewen had were with:

- * Geelong Gas Company as a Director.
- * Council Member of Morongo Girls College for 37 years.
- * President and Life Member of Geelong Art Gallery.
- * Member of Geelong Hospital Gala Board and Life Governor 1989.
- * Elder of the Presbyterian Church.

As well as these commitments, Ewen threw his whole support behind Apex, always making himself available for Annual Dinners, Conferences,

Charter Nights - he would travel almost anywhere for Apex, and was just as happy talking with and encouraging newer members, as he was at the head table in the role of Guest Speaker or Guest of Honour.

Generations of Apexians will remember Ewen for his ability to inspire and encourage, his enthusiasm was magnetic, and his on-going commitment from 1931 for almost another 70 years marks him as a man apart in the annals of the Association of Apex Clubs of Australia."



Christmas party will be at Dirty Dick's Theatre Restaurant.


MELBOURNE/GIPPSLAND: October meeting was a combined meeting at Werribee.

Next day in his letter box were two tickets to the Policemen's Ball.

Some days later he cut a politician's hair and didn't charge him because of his services to the community. When he arrived at his shop next morning there were 20 politicians waiting at the door.
