


Redlands district, perhaps in 2002.



WYNNUM-MANLY: The Club's Christmas party was held at the home of Ron and Melda Miller. In February






Redland's members Chris Pike, David Cameron, Peter Jackson & Juri Denisenko at the New Year's Eve progressive dinner.
