



n perusal of past Apex 40 Annual Reports, the least satisfying task is asking Clubs to re-affiliate and pay their fees each year. The situation has not changed this year. Thanks go to the active Club Secretaries who sent in their 1999/2000 affiliation fees.

There are 63 Clubs and nine Membersa lirge on our mailing list. Even after posting out second reminder notices and contacting by phone those Clubs who had not paid, it is very frustrating to find 34 Clubs still have not paid their re-affiliation fees. Members of those defaulting Clubs are probably unaware that they are unfinancial and not contributing to the organisation to which they choose to belong. After the Rort a third reminder will be sent to all unfinancial Clubs.

I have been endeavouring to keep our Club register accurate and up to date, hoping in particular to show our total membership. We have 879 financial members and approximately 700 who are unfinancial. Maybe we will have better success next year?

Thanks to the Moree Club for hosting the 2000 Rort where we experienced and enjoyed typical bush hospitality at the Rort and on the post-Rort tour. The Grampians Rort in 2001 should be a beauty, particularly with the inclusion of our Canadian K40 friends who will join us as part of their Australian tour.

Apex 40's finances are reasonably healthy thanks mainly to a \$500 cheque received, being profit generated by the Bendigo Rort organisers. Well done Bendigo.

Prior to arriving in Moree, the South African group had visited Perth, Melbourne and Sydney and, following the Rort they were to fly to Auckland for a tour of New Zealand.

We will be visited next year by a group of up to 40 Canadian K40 members who will be attending the Rort in the Grampians. Their tour has been planned on the basis of mostly home hosting by Apex 40 members which will give many of us an opportunity to afford these ex-Kin of Canada members and their wives some real Aussie hospitality. A MEMORABLE RORT AT MOREE

Went to the bush – all 180 of us! The second largest number of members ever to attend a Rort and the best attendance since 1992. There were Apex 40 members from 19 Clubs and, in addition, there was a contingent of 41 Club members (ex-Round Tablers) from overseas, four from New Zealand and six from South Africa. The Moree Club's organising committee, led by Leon Squires, had done a wonderful job in preparing for the Rort and kept everything flowing smoothly over the

whole weekend. From the Welcome Social on Friday night at the Gwyder Convention Centre to the Farewell Breakfast at Moree Racecourse, it was a truly memorable Rort.

The Welcome Social was a time to greet all those friends we hadn't seen since last year and to meet some new Rorters. Peter Miller, Portland, and Rob (Wombat) Walter, Heyfield, had arranged a colourful display about next year's Rort at Hall's Gap in the Grampians, Victoria.

On Saturday morning the Rort was officially opened by the Mayor of Moree, Mike Montgomery, at the Moree Plains Gallery, followed by a walking tour around some of Moree's historic buildings. Then it was on the buses.— four of them — for a short trip to the 700 hectare Trawalla Pecan Farm, with its 70,000 trees, where we had a barbeque lunch with the drinks bar manned by pree Apexians. On a tour of the farm we were able to see the mechanical tree-shakers in action harvesting the nuts which supply 90% of the pecans

Saturday night's "Come to the Bush" dinner dance was held at the Kooroogamma woolshed on a property now owned by the Livingston University. The woolshed had been decorated by Moree members for the occasion and provided a great venue for a very enjoyable evening. Dance music was provided by the Spencer Band. A group of Bendigo and Grafton members found that their table had mysteriously vanished while

consumed in Australia.

On Sunday morning we were taken to see over a cotton gin. With such large numbers we had to be split into two groups to visit two separate gins. Then we were all together again for lunch at "Keytah", a most impressive property which has about 5000 hectares growing cotton plus extensive grain growing and beef production. After lunch the Annual General Meeting was conducted by National President David Cameron in the bull ring. The meeting

Three of the Grafton ladies, Carol Moffat, Ros Chessell and Sue McPherson, showed some remarkable




Best Decorated 'Post Rort Tour 2000' Coach






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

The Club is concerned about lack of numbers at meetings; a dinner planned for March was cancelled due to lack of numbers.






