This year there has not been a lot of activity, and as a result we have no new Clubs within Apex 40. While we have 3 or 4 individual requests for information, they have in most cases joined an existing club or become a Member at Large.

Four clubs have folded (Hobart, Blue Mountains, Bundaberg and Wendouree), while our overall membership appears to be stagnating. To overcome this I can only suggest it is up to the Clubs, and perhaps we could have two National Contacts for Membership, one up North and the other down South.

received, and for the donation we gave the Foundation. Dot has indicated that we don't use Apex enough to promote ourselves and is quite prepared to give us space providing we send her information. It all comes back to promoting ourselves and communication, if we want to be known. Apex itself has now stopped the downward trend of membership but is still below the 4000 figure even though they have extended the retirement age to 45 for both men and women in Apex. At one stage Apex was thinking we should change our name to Apex 45 but your Board feels this is not necessary.

## THE HALLS GAP RORT & PRE-RORT TOUR

This year there was a Pre Rort tour, which consisted of a bus and a half (55 of us, of whom 21 were Canadians) travelling around part of Victoria and SA for 3 days, and getting to know each other before the big occasion of the "Halls Gap Rort".

Those of us who went on the Pre Rort tour thoroughly enjoyed ourselves, we visited Port Fairy, sailed the Moyne River, passed some old ship wrecks, then onto Portland for an overnight stop; the next day a conducted tour of the huge wharf at Portland where we saw the facilities at close hand. Next was the Portland Smelter where we visited their environmental works, which have won world wide acclaim as a plant nursery and reclaimed wetlands.

Of interest was a river cruise at Nelson up the Glenelg River at dusk, with a subsequent BBQ beside the river, and the "entertainment" of the local

"Aboriginal" singers (Wombat and another Portland member) and their corroboree dance, which had all of us in fits of laughter.

On we went through Mount Gambier to see its famous Blue Lake, and to Yallum Park where we visited an old Victorian Mansion built by John Riddoch, who was an original settler in the area and whose name is used by Wynns in naming some of their wines. Naturally while in the Coonawarra area we had to visit Wynns winery to taste some of their wares, then onto Horsham for the night. The next day a visit to the Wool factory (900 Saxon Merino sheep under cover) and Murtoa before arriving at Halls Gap, in readiness for the Welcome Social on Friday night, and the commencement of the RORT.

This year registrations were just under 200 and we had a total of 3 buses and one small 20 seater to travel the

Grampians and the surrounding areas.

Next year's Rort will be at Redlands, from 17th- 20th May, and there will be a Post Rort trip. The 2003 Rort will be in Mildura, to celebrate our 30th Birthday. Saturday night was at the Mountain View Restaurant, where a

band playing music from the 50's - 70's kept us going until after midnight.

Sunday was a trip around the Mount Difficult Range and various lookouts, where we were able to see through the mist to the valley below and to Halls Gap. By this time some of us were starting to slow down, and after lunch at the Footy Oval some went back to the motel, while others visited Brambuk Aboriginal Cultural Centre.

Our last evening together was at the Colonial Motel for a sit down meal, and entertainment by a magician and a poet. Plenty of talking over plenty of drinks, and then back to pack the case and to bed, and next morning the farewell breakfast at the Footy Ground.

All too soon the RORT had come to an end, and farewells said to our Canadian friends and our old and new Apex 40 friends, and then home. A great Rort from Portland and Heywood Clubs, with special thanks to Wombat and Peter Miller.

All RORTS are different but we certainly lived up to our motto "For continuing Friendship" on this one.

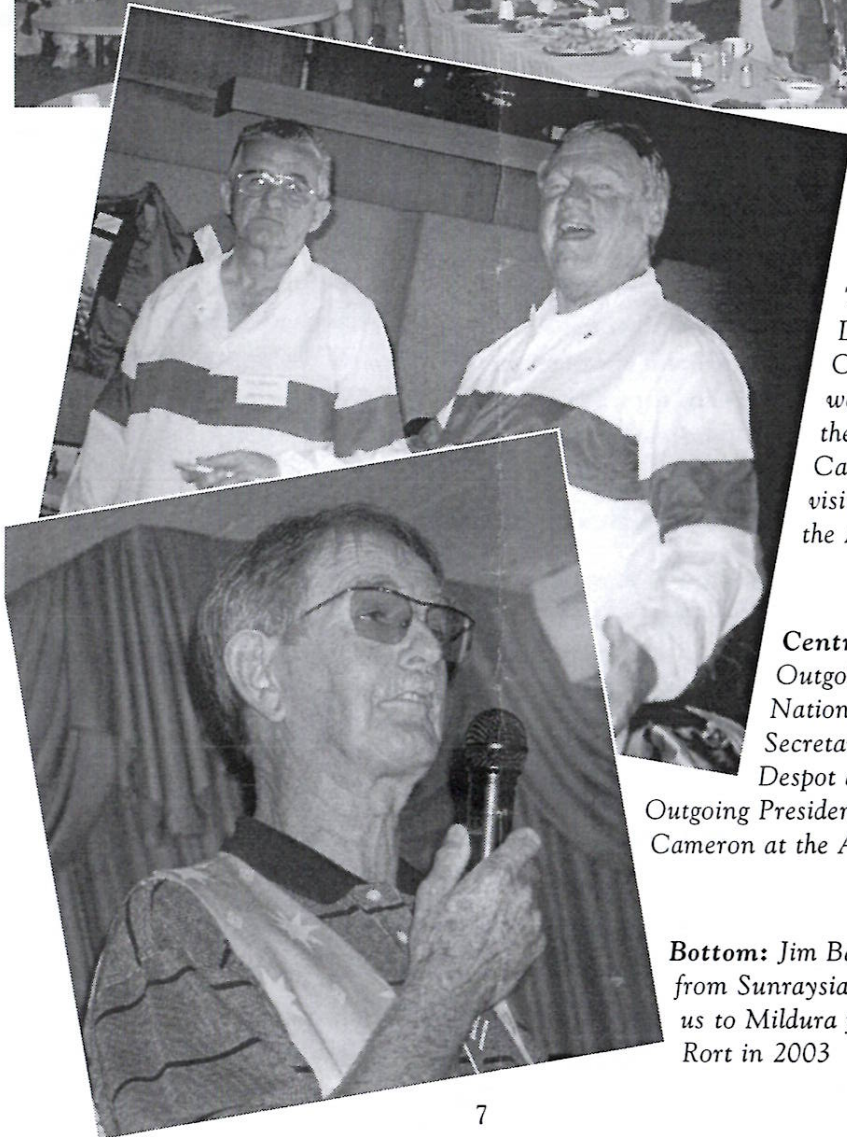
