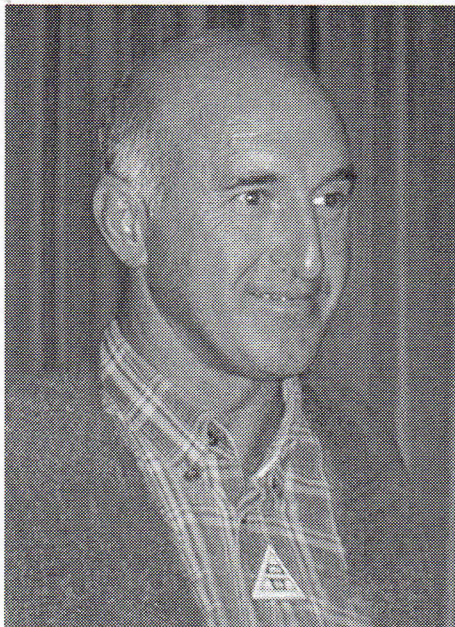

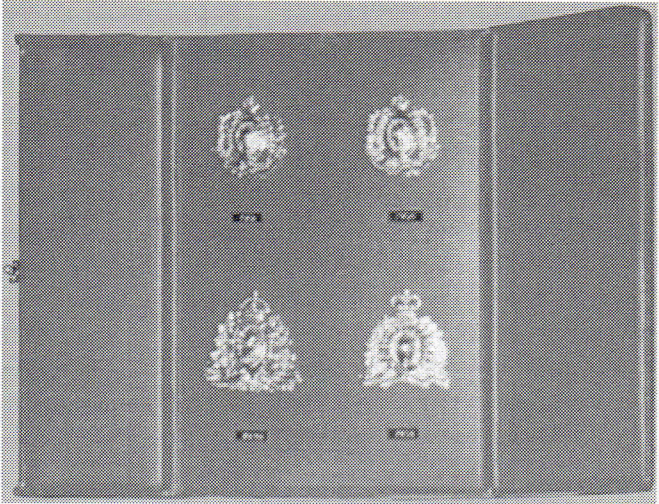
We look forward to seeing many members and prospective members at the Inaugural Dinner to be held on 8th August 2001 at the White Swan Restaurant, High Street, Penrith."
