

SUNRAYSIA RORT 2003

THE SUNRAYSIA RAGE - FOR OUR COMING OF AGE

The time is drawing closer, details are being examined for our 21st Birthday on 9th to 12th May 2003. As I promised in the last issue, more details.

Friday evening Registration and Welcome Social are being held at the Greek Hall, a short distance from all accommodation. This will be open from late afternoon for registrations.

Saturday we commence by bus, to go to an original irrigation pumping station on the Murray River where we will have morning tea. Later in the morning, we will board the P.S. Mundoo to travel to Trentham Estate Winery for lunch and tastings. This is in a beautiful setting, overlooking the river, and will be very pleasant. We re-board the Mundoo, where we will have our Annual General Meeting on the way back to the wharf at Mildura. You will be taken back to your accommodation for a rest, before getting back on the buses to go to Irymple Leisure Centre for the big birthday party of the weekend.

Sunday sees us briefly heading to the river again to see the cliffs, for which the town of Red Cliffs was named, then into Red Cliffs to have morning tea and see 'Big Lizzie'. This is a huge traction engine, which was used in the early 1920's to clear the land for planting of vines in the original soldier settlement area of 33,000 acres.

We then move on to the Meringur Pioneer Settlement, which commemorates the pioneers of the wheat farming areas of the district. Lunch will be served and time can be spent looking at the many fascinating buildings and exhibits. We head back again to home before going back to Red Cliffs to the Club for our evening meal and entertainment.

The farewell breakfast is to be held on the banks of the river, in and around a relocated woolshed. From there we say farewell to those who are not staying on for the tour.

Among the places the tour will be visiting are the Inland Botanical Gardens, Mungo Station/Walls of China, the historic Port of Wentworth and Hattah National Park.

APEX 40 GOLF COMPETITION

At the last AGM held during the Rort at Brisbane in May, it was agreed to introduce a golf competition for Apex 40 Clubs, to be conducted during the Summer/Autumn period.

The rules for the competition will be as follows:

- 1) An 18 hole Stableford round of golf is to be played each year at any time from December to the following March.
- 2) Each team to consist of six or more financial Apex 40 Members. Take the six best score-cards (which must include the score-cards of at least two players who have never held an official golf handicap those males will play off a 36 handicap, and females off a 45 handicap [as per WGA rules] or such lesser handicap determined by the Team Captain).

The team captain is responsible for the validity of all players' handicaps.

- 3) Score-cards to be sent to the National Secretary/Treasurer at least 30 days before the AGM.
- 4) At least one member of the winning

team must be present at the AGM at the following RORT to collect the trophy, or it will go to the team with the next best score with a member present.

So much for the rules, now what about a trophy? Well, it seems that Brian Roach has this in hand, with some assistance from Max Cheney who is putting his wood turning skills to work.

Next, of course, we need participants. There must be many keen golfers or would-be golfers in most of our Clubs wanting to do battle for their Club against other Apex 40 Clubs. Melbourne-Gippsland Apex 40 Club has a golf day each year, generally between Christmas and New Year, when a number of members, with varving skill levels, play a Stableford competition in the morning and follow on with a BBQ lunch and the odd ale (or red, or whatever). Why not have a go? All you need is access to a golf course and someone willing to get things organized.
