

In my last report, I mentioned that I was to attend the Apex National Convention in Perth as the guest of the then National President Paul Gallagher. It was a very valuable experience, with Apex recommitting their support for Apex 40 as the organisation post Apex.

My worries about the Apex Founders Club were unfounded. This is an organisation that we could all belong to, and does not aim to compete with Apex

40, so we should keep our ears to the ground and stay in touch to learn more.

There was significant interest in our organisation and several Apexians approached me following my 5 minutes of glory (or is it fame?) to discuss things from how to form an Apex 40 club to how can we assist Apex in the formation of Apex Clubs, and so the continuance of that organisation that we found so fulfilling. It should be noted that our membership now exceeds that of Apex, and as such, we should be starting to worry about the continued existence of our own organisation, if we (and they) don't do something now.

I also provided information re the formation of Apex 40 clubs to several interested parties whilst in Perth, and will be following those leads in the near future.

Looking forward to 2011 Rort, information has been posted on the website, and also in this edition of the Roaring 40's, with regard to a possible tour itinerary for New Zealand. It should be noted that the Rugby Union World Cup will be held in New Zealand in approximately the same time frame as the Rort, and as such, accommodation etc. will be at a premium. With this in mind, RT41 (in particular Derek Johns) has asked if we can provide approximate numbers as soon as possible (this year!). So far I have been contacted by no more than a dozen people to say that they are definite starters, so if you consider that you will be travelling to NZ in 2011, I need to know as soon as possible.

This month, Brian Roach is representing me at the Zone 9 reunion in Bathurst to assist in putting Apex 40 in front of the people attending, and providing assistance to the Nepean Valley guys who are doing the organisation.

I am personally looking forward to the combined outing this month of the Bendigo, Melbourne/Gippsland, Melbourne Norwesters and hopefully Geelong Clubs. I am sure that more news of this outing will appear on the website and in the next edition of the roaring 40's. I am also hoping to personally attend the Apex Queensland State Convention to be held in Goondiwindi next January, and have received several indications of interest from others of our membership.

I have put together a Tour Itinerary for you, as per usual it will probably change a bit before the Tour and I look forward to hearing suggestions from you because it is your Tour.

From what I have heard so far it would appear that there could be around 80 of you coming so that means 2 coaches and unfortunately there will be too many for home hosting but Tina and I (God willing) will travel with you. Where there are 41 Clubs along the way we will try to get them to show you their areas attractions and come and meet with you.

Day 1, Wednesday, 1st June 2011:

Arrive; Christchurch airport, met by 41 Club New Zealand hosts, and spend rest of day on tour of city highlights, travel by coaches and foot and perhaps meet up with Christchurch 41 Club for dinner and get together, hotel/motel for night.

Day 2, Thursday, 2nd June:

Travel North stopping at Kaikoura for lunch, should there be enough of you who want to go Whale or Dolphin watching that could be arranged. I will find prices for this later. **183kms, 2hr:50.**

Continue on to Blenheim for night, there is a strong 41 Club there and I'm sure they would have something to amuse you all for the evening, hotel/motel for night. **129kms, 1hr:50.**

Day 3, Friday, 3rd June:

Explore a little of the Marlborough wine district, Sauvignon Blanc Country, maybe a little taste or two!

Then perhaps lunch at Havelock, "Green Lipped Mussel Capital of the World" at head of Pelorus Sound. Onwards and over the hills to Nelson in time to settle in your accommodation for the weekend and meet and greet with 41 Club members. 116kms, 1hr:45.

Day 4, Saturday 4th June:

Join with 41er's on their program for day and evening, there will be something planned I'm sure and it will be fun!

Day 5, Sunday 5th June:

41 Club New Zealand AGM and Apex 40 AGM in morning, have lunch together, then afternoon activities and Fancy Dress (themed evening) with skits continues into the wee small hours.

Day 6, Monday 6th June:

Having had such a great time and made so many new friends and maybe caught up with some old ones I know you will all want to stay but!!!!!

We will have Farewell Breakfast together then back on the buses and travel South West through Murchison, the Buller Gorge and stop at Punakiki to see the Pancake Rocks then on to Greymouth for the night.

No 41 Club here so will be on own for the first time, hotel/motel for 1 night.

290kms, 4hr:35.

Day 7, Tuesday 7th June:

From here it is possible for those who haven't enough time to go back to Christchurch on the Trans Alpine Express or if there were a larger number of you wishing to go home early we could send 1 of the Coaches across Arthur's Pass and continue down the West Coast with the other.

Those with the time and inclination or should I say, brave and foolish enough will continue, lunch at Ross, maybe a stop at Okarito Lagoon or Lake Mapourika and down to Franz Josef or Fox Glaciers where we will stay, hotel/motel for 2 nights.

177kms, 3hr:10.

Day 8, Wednesday 8th June:

Around the Glaciers, perhaps a walk around Lake Matheson to get the reflections of Mt Cook on the water, take a walk or helicopter flight onto the glaciers, plenty for you to do and see here.

Day 9, Thursday 9th June:

Carry on down the Coast till Haast, we could have lunch there then turn inland and through the Gates of Haast and over to Wanaka.

You are now in the "Central Otago Wine Region" and a beautiful winter playground, an extra layer of clothes will keep out the chill and Southern hospitality is pretty good too!

Hotel/motel for 1 night.

287kms, 5hr:55.

Day 10, Friday 10th June:

Onwards to Queenstown, probably by the main road through the vineyards and following the rivers but possibly if there is no snow or ice on that road over the Crown Range with amazing views of the mountains and valleys.

Perhaps we could side track through the old gold mining town; Arrowtown. You will have afternoon and next morning free to explore Queenstown, Shotover Jets, Earnslaw Steamer, Bungy Jumping, Gondola ride or, dare I suggest it, even some retail therapy!!!!! Hotel/motel for 1 night. 117kms, 1hr:50.

Day 11, Saturday 11th June:

Morning around Queenstown then travel to Te Anau, "Gateway to Fiordland" in afternoon, going alongside Lake Wakatipu through Kingston along the way.

Hotel/motel for 2 nights.

170kms, 2hr:45.

Day 12, Sunday 12th June:

Travel up the side of Lake Te Anau, over the main divide, through the Homer Tunnel and down to Milford Sound where we will take a boat cruise to wonder at the sheer cliffs and spectacular scenery of the Fiord. Back to Te Anau for the night.

242kms, 4hr:40.

Day 13, Monday 13th June:

Te Anau to Dunedin, with a bit of luck we may be able to get the Gore 41 Club to meet us then onwards across the mighty Clutha River to Dunedin.

There is not a 41 Club here but there are some 41er's who might give us a bit of a guide around this historic Scottish City.

Hotel/motel for 1 night.

290kms, 4hr:15.

Day 14, Tuesday 14th June:

Today we head northward to Oamaru for lunch and a look at the restored old part of the town, hopefully there will be a gang of 41er's to show us around.

Then it's on the buses once more waving our goodbyes to new friends and up to Timaru for the night, once again there is a strong 41 Club here that I'm sure will be happy to meet us. Our last night as a group so perhaps a dinner together tonight?

Hotel/motel for 1 night.

199kms, 2hr:50

Day 15, Wednesday 15th June:

Last day on the buses, north again through Ashburton and across the Canterbury Plains back to Christchurch and Harewood Airport where we will all go our separate ways.

Yes I know it's hard to part but home will be calling.

I am sure we will miss one another after this time and there will be a great deal of new and lasting friends throughout New Zealand and Australia.

163kms, 2hr:10

Well there you go a tour to remember with a touch of frost and lots of fun for all. Bring lots of warm clothes, hats and gloves.

I do hope this tour appeals to you all and I look forward to your comments. Of course this is not till June 2011 so we have only been able to get an idea of prices, it is also Rugby World Cup time so we really need to know some numbers very soon so we can lock in as much as possible before accommodation fills up.

This price includes:- Return flight. For an example I have used Sydney – Christchurch, other return flights could vary in price.

Registration and the full program in Nelson; All travel on Coach; All accommodation, based on twin share rooms. (*There will be a single supplement for those travelling alone*). Breakfasts have been costed for all but for 4 mornings.

Total cost of NZ\$2495.00 per person for a great 15 day around "The Mainland" South Island of New Zealand.

Of course if there are some of you who can only take a week off and wish to return to Christchurch from Greymouth there will be a reduced price.

As mentioned elsewhere in this publication, the NZ Tour will clash with the 2011 Rugby World Cup being held in New Zealand. It is imperative that those intending to go advise Bob Ireland in the very near future.

THE APEX FOUNDATION RESEARCH INTO INTELLECTUAL DISABILITY A SHORT HISTORY

At the recent Rort held at Forresters Beach Resort, Melbourne – Gippsland Branch won the won the "Bill Cunliffe Memorial Attendance Award" (also known as the "Challenge Trophy for Best Attendance"). During his acceptance of the trophy, Branch President Geoff Angus took the opportunity to advise Rorters of the continued existence of the first Foundation established by Apex. The following is a summary of Apex's first Foundation.

This Apex Foundation for Research into Intellectual Disability was the first Foundation established by the Association of Apex Clubs. Its formation was the culmination of the 3 years of the Association Service Scheme Aid to Mentally Retarded in the mid 1960's. Two Apex Clubs – Croydon in Melbourne and Maffra in Gippsland – quite independently proposed the idea of this service scheme. The intention of the scheme was for Apex Clubs to provide facilities, equipment and support for people, especially children, who were intellectually disabled. The term "mentally retarded" has in more recent years been replaced by the term "intellectual disability". The Foundation changed its name to reflect the new terminology some years ago.

The idea of a Foundation came from Brian Horgan, a member of the Apex Club of Croydon and who later became the President of the Association of Apex Clubs. Following the many outstanding service projects by Apex Clubs as part of their obligation to participate in the service scheme, the establishment of a Foundation was to be a lasting effort by Apex to continue its involvement in the field of intellectual disability.

The Articles of Association and Memorandum of Association of the Foundation were prepared by the late Brian Nanscawen, a lawyer and then

current member of Apex. Brian later served on the Foundation's Board of Directors for many years. Brian Horgan became the Foundation's first Honorary Secretary, a position he held from 1967 to 1978. Kevin Morrish, another ex member of Croydon Apex Club, was the next Honorary Secretary from 1978 until 2007

The Foundation was established as a not for profit company, limited by guarantees by the members of the company. There are no shareholders and no dividends are paid. All net proceeds from the investments and operation of the company are used for making annual grants to people working in the field of intellectual disability, for growing the investment assets of the Foundation and for other purposes related to intellectual disability. The Board members and the members of the Sub-committees have always provided their time and expertise in an honorary capacity.

The initial amount raised by Apex Clubs during the third year of the Association Service Scheme *Aid to Mentally Retarded* to establish the Foundation was just over \$100,000. A goal of \$100,000 was based on the equivalent of 500 Clubs donating \$200 each. Many Clubs provided much larger sums of money while others were less able to do so. The assets of the Foundation as at the end of the 2007/2008 financial year were in excess of \$2 million but this amount has now been reduced because of the economic downturn. Over recent years the Foundation typically provided up to \$80,000 in research grants each year.

The increase in the Foundation's assets has firstly been due to two significant bequests – one from the estate of Miss Dorothy Ross and one from the estate of Dr. David Richards. David was the President of the Association of Apex Clubs at the time the Foundation was established and was the President (in effect the Chairman of the Board of Directors) from its establishment in 1967 until his untimely death in 1988. The second reason for the Foundation's success has been the pro-active stance taken by the Board of Directors using expert advice for its investments.

The current Board of Directors consists of eight members and all except two were previously members of Apex. The Chairman is Peter Bailey, who was a Victorian State President of Apex and the Secretary is Paul Reeves, who was a long time member of Nunawading Apex Club. The Board members fill two sub-committees – the Finance Development Sub-committee and the Finance & Investment Sub-committee. The Scientific Sub-committee consists of three experts in the field of intellectual disabilities – Associate Prof Dinah Reddihough, Professor Vicki Anderson and Associate Professor Michael McKay – who recommend annually which applicants should receive grants and the level of funding that should be provided.

In 2007 the Board of the Foundation agreed to be the prime financial source for the establishment of a *Chair in Developmental Medicine* by the University of Melbourne in the Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry & Health Sciences.

Developmental medicine covers all forms of disability but since intellectual disability is the most common form of disability (and often occurs in conjunction with other forms of disability) the Foundation's Board considered that it was able to support the establishment of the Chair, despite it not solely dealing with intellectual disability.

The intention is to seek a world class researcher to the position of Professor, who may or may not be an Australian. The important criterion is that the person appointed will be high calibre and who will ultimately head up a team of high quality researchers and clinicians who will attract a high level of funding. The inaugural name of the Chair is expected to be the *Apex Australia Chair in Developmental Medicine*.

The Foundation has agreed to an annual grant of \$250,000 for five years, with the proviso that if the proposal should become financially self-sufficient after 3 years, the Foundation reserves the right to review these annual grants for years 4 and 5.
