

BENDIGO - Bob Caldwell

Bendigo Apex 40 Celebrates its 32nd Year by welcoming Apex 40 and Club 41 New Zealand Members to 'Our Golden Town' Bendigo for the 'Gold and Old' Apex 40 Rort Number 35.

"GOLD & OLD" Rort Friday 30th April - Friday 7th May 2010

Bendigo is a buzz at the present moment awaiting an influx of Rorters with intentions of visiting the City of Greater Bendigo & Surrounding District.

Bendigo is the fastest growing inland city in Australia. It is unbelievable that the population has increased to outnumber Ballarat in the period since we hosted our last National Apex 40 Rort of "Wine, Mine & Dine in '99".

Rorters will have a chance to experience the following attractions:

Bendigo boasts the Best Regional Art Gallery in Australia which for the last 3 years has been the only gallery in Victoria to display the "National Archibald" Entries.

The Sacred Heart Cathedral, the last English Gothic-style built cathedral in the Southern Hemisphere. 'The Great Stupa', under construction which will be the largest Buddhist stupa in the Southern Hemisphere. The Capital Theatre hosting national & international acts and the Great Tourist Information Centre, now housed in the old architecturally pleasing G.P.O, which everyone should endeavour to visit (if possible).

The greatest collection of magnificent ornate buildings, built in the late Victorian colonial-style of the Gold boom era, outside of the main capital cities. Prominent buildings include the Bendigo Town Hall (1859, '83-85) Post Office, Law Courts (1892-96) Shamrock Hotel (1897), Mechanics Institute (1854) & School of Mines (1864) & Fortuna Villa (1854-1907)

Many examples of classical architecture that rank amongst the finest classical commercial buildings in Australia and include the Colonial Bank (1887), former Masonic Hall (1873-74), Bendigo Pottery (1858)

An abundance of wineries, which produce and release a broad selection of varieties of wines, with reds (shiraz & cab. sav) being a specialty. Home to the finest restaurants, cafes, wine bars, pubs and local produce outlets in country Victoria.

Bendigo is the home of the biggest Swap Meet in the Southern Hemisphere and the Tramways Museum & Depot is the oldest working tram depot in Australia, dating back to 1903.

The Latrobe University of Melbourne's Bendigo Campus is the University's second largest campus. This has created a big industry for the town especially with many students requiring rental accommodation.

All of the above are quite accessible from the four accommodation venues selected for the Rort are available. The three motels are beside each other and the caravan park is on the city fringe not too far away.

Melbourne is discovering us on a daily basis. Investors from the capital now own over a third of all our real estate (for both rental & owner-occupiers), which in turn is causing a sharp rise in prices. This prosperity has a down side making it difficult for the local home-buyers, particularly 1st home-buyers.

Rort Program – 30th April to 3rd May

So, as you can see, we have a great backdrop for presenting "A Week-Long Rort/Post Rort Program" with 'Suitable Accommodation', 'Fellowship', 'Tours, Venues, Food, & Entertainment' & just 'Pure Fun'. All this, despite the fact that Bendigo lost 54 homes a year ago on Black Saturday with residents starting to move back. We are also coming off 10 yrs of dry weather. But you will be pleased to know that we had some reasonable rains in Jan/Feb. and we are hoping for more by the time you all arrive.

Suitable Accommodation: The 3 selected motels are within 100 m. of each other and are all opposite Lake Weeroona, a Bendigo landmark created in 1878. So, we will be all quite close to our "Welcoming Night" at Quills Restaurant on the Friday Night, the Dinner Dance at "Silks" (at the racecourse) on the Saturday Night and the "Farewell Breakfast" on the Monday morning. The Big 4 Caravan Park is 2.5 kms away from the motels and situated beside the racecourse, which certainly assists us to move everyone with some ease and comfort, as all accommodation is north of the CBD, on the Echuca-side of our city.

Fellowship Opportunities: Obviously, this is what the whole week is about and hence the opportunity to mix & mingle has been made a priority of the total program, starting on the Friday night and ending on the following Friday for Post-Rorters. Also, with an equal split of attendees between the 3 motels & the caravan park, the opportunity for informal gatherings (i.e. a happy hours) is certainly on the agenda. The invitation is there Go for it!

Tours, Venues, Food & Entertainment: The tours, venues & entertainment have been organised to give an obvious 'gold & old' theme to the Rort. As for the food, I don't believe anyone will go hungry. ("Just like all other Rorts, we tend to over-indulge"). But just in case you need verification, we have planned & organised the following:
Friday Night - finger food & some local wine tasting from 6.30 pm – 10.00 pm at Quills Restaurant, found at the LakeView Motel (one of the Rort Motels)

Saturday - Sacred Heart Cathedral tour, morning tea & special service + 2 other rotating group tours of the Art Gallery & The Chinese Museum; snack-type lunch at the Big Hill Vineyard + Annual Meeting; a dinner dance in your 'good clobber' at "Silks", a 3 course meal with a complimentary wine and all you 'young groovers' put on your 'pumps' to dance to music provided by a great local band 'The Impalas'. ("The caravan parkers won't have too far to roll home but they just might get lost!

Sunday - Daylesford for morning tea & lunch at "Cricket Willow", cricket museum, antique barn & chocolate tasting ("Keep your credit cards in your pockets"); evening meal back at the Big Hill Vineyard in your appropriate "Gold & Old" casual clobber or whatever, relevant to the early days of Bendigo (e.g miner, trooper, mine-owner, landedgentry, professional gentleman etc.) with music supplied by another local band "Where's Wally?" Unfortunately we could not get a Bush Band, as the only two Bendigo Bush Bands heard you were all coming to town, so they both have <u>disbanded last December</u>. Excuse the pun. Boom! Boom! and some good old Aussie Ballads etc being performed by club groups or whatever. So, come prepared for a good night of frivolity, the unknown and awards!

Monday - Back at Quills Restaurant for the Rort's "Farewell Breakfast"

Post-Rort Program – 3rd May to 7th May

It will be great to have all Post-Rorters remain on in Bendigo for a further 5 days, to explore more of the central region of our State, and return each day back to your 'Bendigo Home away from Home'.

Post Rorters will be comforted with the knowledge that you will be accompanied by at least 8 - 12 Bendigo Apex 40 members for all of the 5 days. Bendigo Apex 40 Members just don't want anyone to get homesick, run out of tissues etc. or much worse still get up to mischief without them!

Monday: Bendigo Tours of Talking Trams, Central Debrah Gold Mine and Bendigo Pottery – Australia's Oldest Pottery. A group lunch is being organised for Rorters at the Pottery Café (at your own expense). Dinner is at Bickley's Barn, which is finishing up as a dining venue after our visit.

Currently owned by the Forrester Family, with 30 hectares of vines, a cellar door, wine museum & café, in which we have organised a group lunch and tasting. Dinner at Lynne Vale Winery

Thursday:- Trip to Echuca. (Remember the T.V Series "All The Rivers Run". It seems Bob Caldwell's wife Annie still drools over the star of the series, John Waters.) Morning tea at the Beechworth Bakery (a small franchised chain of 3 Victorian country bakeries), National Holden Museum Tour & A One Hour Trip on the Paddle Steamer "Pride of the Murray", lunch (at own expense), free-time, followed by a tour & dinner at the Great Aussie Beer Shed & Museum of Australian Memorabilia.

Friday:- Central Bendigo, Touring the new recently-built, modern headquarters of the Bendigo Bank (a real eye-opener), a guided tour of the Historical Precinct of Bendigo, and topped off with a Gillies Pie (a famous product of Bendigo) after walking through our famous Rosiland Park to the Bendigo Bowling Club.
