Other XEPA Members, Ross and Mary Smith were in Japan when the earthquake hit. Ross managed to quickly hire a bus, group together a number of Aussies staying in his motel and take them to Osaka for an early flight to Australia.

A few more Apex 40 members have passed on since Christmas. Some were well known to their club members but not as well known to the wider Apex 40

community. Past National President, Malcolm Clark passed away on March 6th and our Webmaster, Keith Haddon left us on March 15th. Mary and I along with a number of Apex 40 members attended Keith's Cremation Ceremony at Deception Bay.

Keith and Liz had only lived in Queensland for a few years after many years in Bathurst, New South Wales. A memorial service will be held for Keith in Bathurst on April 8th. Apex 40 member Peter Ryall conducted the funeral service for Malcolm Clark and Malcolm's Obituary can be found on the Apex 40Website. Our sympathies go to Marian and Liz and families. Thanks also to Liz Haddon for offering to continue as Webmaster. This offer was unanimously endorsed by National Board and I am sure will have the backing of the whole of Apex 40.

Last weekend Mary and I were kindly invited to and thoroughly enjoyed attending a combined lunch of the Maryborough, Hervey Bay and Gympie Apex 40 Clubs. The venue was at the Theebine Hotel, not far off the Bruce Highway between Gympie and Maryborough. From reports The Hervey Bay Club continued the fellowship all of the way home in their bus. We had met with Maryborough and Gympie members before but this was our first encounter with the Hervey Bay Club. We have also attended meetings of our local XEPA Club and the nearby Wynnum Manly Club.

The New Zealand Rort is not far off – We are looking forward to catching up with our old friends and it will be a great opportunity to meet some more of our New Zealand counterparts. Sadly though there will be many, many regular Rorters missing in Nelson. I also am appreciative of the efforts our New Zealand counterparts have put in to accommodate our Rort and Tour with their Annual Convention.

Hopefully we will be lucky enough to see those of you who missed the Nelson Rort at the Fraser Coast Rort in 2012. It appears that there will many Rort Virgins at the Fraser Coast Rort to meet, greet and enjoy fellowship with.

APEX LOOKS TOWARDS THE FUTURE

It is no secret that the Association has been in membership decline since the eighties, with our current membership numbers back to those of the mid 1930's. If we are to arrest this decline, we need to step out of the downward spiral and make some significant changes.

With this in mind, the National Board has taken the bold step of proposal radical changes to the structure of the association. The changes are designed to provide better services to the clubs more efficiently and cost effectively than we are currently able to achieve.

The first draft of the proposed changes was endorsed at the National Board meeting on 13thMarch, and will now be presented to members for ideas and feedback. The most cost effective means of disseminating the information and gathering feedback is through the use of technology and the Internet, hence a website has been set up temporarily just for this purpose, http://www.apexfuture.org.au.

Copies of the proposal are available on the website as well as the mechanism to provide feedback and comments. Please take the time to read the document and provide relevant feedback. There will also be further e-bulletins sent out when any changes of note are made to the document, an at each milestone along the way. This proposal is for significant change and is no small undertaking, so having the right plan in place to start with is extremely important so please pass this information on to all Apexians and take the time to discuss it within your clubs.

MALCOLM LESLIE CLARK (Wyong Apex 40)

It is with regret that we announce the death on Sunday March 6th of Malcolm Clark, our national President 1997-1999.

At age 64, Malcolm was too young to die. Yet let us take heart from the fact that, even though it was a life taken too short, we know that now he is at last in peace. In February 2008 he was diagnosed with Malignant Mesothelioma. He fought a courageous battle for more than 3 years, and those who saw Malcolm in his last months know the pain and suffering he endured. Thankfully, that has now been spared him.



Malcolm Leslie Clark was born at

Wakefield in Yorkshire, England, on June 7th 1946. Right to the end, he still had much of his Yorkshire accent – friends jokingly called him "MALCOOM", and there was the time he organised an Apex convention with the theme "A Mutton Jump" (something to do with a sheep on the spit), which he always referred to as "A MOOTEN JOOMP". Mention should also be made of the slightly risqué T-shirt Malcolm had screen printed for the Convention – a real Malcolm Clark trait: causing a few raised eyebrows with risqué jokes or stories!

Malcolm had 3 siblings, brothers Roy and John and a sister Betty. He met Marian Higgott at a circus where he had a casual job cleaning up the Big Top. At that time he was going out with one of her college friends who introduced the two of them that night at the circus. They were married on the 23rd of September 1967 in Middleton, Leeds, Yorkshire. In 1970 with no job lined up, he and Marian migrated to Australia. Their sole possessions were packed in 3 tea chests, and they also had a pram – as Marian was 6 months pregnant with Ian. He discovered when they reached Australia that his engineering qualifications were in high demand, and he immediately picked up work in the power stations around the Central Coast, work that he was to embrace until he eased himself into semi-retirement. After his semi-retirement his sense of adventure really kicked in and he took on positions around the world as a trouble-shooter for under-performing power stations. These contracts took him to places as diverse as the La Trobe Valley in Victoria, The Philippines, Bangladesh, India (twice he ventured there) and even Libya (before today's troubles!).

Community was an important part of Malcolm's life and from the time he arrived in Australia he was determined to assimilate into the Australian way of life. In this he succeeded admirably – he loved a drink, enjoyed barbecues and he joined our

Australian service club, Apex. But the highpoint of his desire to become part of Australia was when he and Marian became naturalised Australians on Australia Day (January 26), 1990 at The Entrance. And the person who naturalised them on that day was the Australian Prime Minister - none other than the most quintessential Aussie Prime Minister in our history – Bob Hawke.

Malcolm was a dedicated Apexian, and he held all major positions within his Club, Wyong, including that of President. He served as District Governor and on Zone Board. Upon his compulsory retirement from Apex when he turned 40, he was awarded Senior Active Status of his Club in recognition of his committed work as an Apexian. He immediately joined Wyong Apex 40. He devoted an enormous amount of energy to Apex 40 and was largely responsible for the Wyong Club today being one of the biggest and strongest in Australia. He held the position of President on multiple occasions, and at other times co-ordinated many, many highly successful dinners, conventions, weekends away, and numerous social activities. Whenever possible, he always attended the National Rort. One major disappointment for him was when his doctor refused him permission to attend the 2008 Perth Rort shortly after he was first diagnosed with his illness. His crowning achievement was when he was elected the National President of Apex40 in 1997. His last major effort was the organisation of the highly successful Rort held in Wyong in 2009 – a task he was determined to see through despite the debilitating nature of his illness.

Malcolm became heavily involved in his professional organisation, the Institution of Engineers. He always believed that the Institution should involve itself in community affairs, and he ensured that this was the case when he was President of the Newcastle branch and also President of the Central Coast branch.

Again, conscious of community, Malcolm served with the Warnervale Bush Fire Brigade, filling the positions of President, Secretary, and Treasurer, as well as being Deputy Captain. True to his adventurous spirit, he was frequently in the thick of action, and had his eyebrows singed on more than one occasion!

He just loved his Hash House Harriers! He joined them in the Philippines in 1998 and continued on with the Central Coast group on his return to Australia, taking on a number of important roles including that of Trail Master. For those of you not familiar with Hash House Harriers, they undertake runs of various types with the aim of finishing up at a place where there is plenty of beer. Sort of like a group of drinkers with a running problem. He and Marian travelled overseas on a number of occasions to attend Hash House events. He kept remarkably fit, always enjoyed running and made many good friends while doing so. Even when he first started chemotherapy, he could still do a 9km run. He enjoyed sport, becoming a playing member of Wyong Bowling Club and playing indoor cricket at the Charmhaven Fitness Centre.

Malcolm delighted in public speaking, and he had great success in public speaking competitions and debates as a member of Apex. Upon his retirement from Apex, he became an adjudicator for these Apex competitions. He started Toastmasters groups in

the power stations on the Central Coast and in The Philippines.

His wife Marian was the absolute love of his life. She supported him in all his activities over the years, furthering her education and holding jobs which enabled them to live comfortably. They arrived in Australia in 1970 with nothing but 3 tea chests and a pram. By the 1980s they had 4 boys. Malcolm and Marian had arrived in Australia with virtually nothing, but they were determined to provide a happy and comfortable life for their sons. They invested what they earned, and in the later years of Malcolm's life had built a portfolio of property and shares to enable them all to enjoy the quality of life to which they aspired.

Malcolm is survived by his wife Marian, his sons Ian, Stephen, Matthew and John, his daughters-in-law Heidi and Melissa, his 7 grandchildren Emily, Thomas, Connor, Jennifer, Jade, Jasmin, and Rhiannon, and his precious pet dog Mitzi.

Sadly our wonderful life in retirement with so much fun, joy, love, took a knock when Keith was diagnosed with aggressive advanced prostate cancer in August 2009.

He was never well from then and despite several fractures and intolerable pain he never gave up hope nor complained.

Sadly for Liz and the family, but for the better for Keith, he passed away at precisely 9:00 am on 15th March surrounded by all his loving family and more.

He was in the palliative care unit at Redcliffe Hospital where he received wonderfully compassionate and professional care for the last 8 days of his life but had been at home, virtually bedridden since about July. He kept his many spread sheets going until the very end. And was doing tasks as treasurer of the Veteran golfers until a couple of days before he died.

I will love him and miss him for ever. Keith and I went back a long way - 1955 in fact! We had a great life, living in four states and making lots of friends along the way. He was energetic, punctual, accurate and precise in every thing he did - traits that would never be attributed to me. I think we had the Yin-Yang thing and that's why we always got along so well. In the words of his GP, Dr Andy Perry: "Keith approached his illness with great dignity, courage and resolve." Not once did he complain or say "why me" but he was confident to the last that he would beat the disease

8/4/2011 BATHURST MEMORIAL SER VICE FOR KEITH HADDON

On a glorious Bathurst (Central West NSW) day on Friday 8th April 2011, approx. 150 family and friends of the late Keith Haddon (Webmaster of the national Apex 40 website), got together at the Bathurst Golf Club (set amongst the vivid colours of the autumn trees) to pay tribute at a Memorial Service to celebrate the life and times of Keith.

The guests came from near and far (including his sister-in- law and family from Perth) and included friends from previous organisations that Keith had been involved with such as the Scouting movement, Bathurst Apex, the Association of Public Authority Surveyors (APAS), Apex 40 and Bathurst Golf Club.

Several speakers relived their memories of Keith, which brought many a tear and laughs, and made for a lovely tribute. Speakers included his first boss from 1975 at the then Central MappingAuthority, located in Bathurst, who developed a special sporting bond with Keith through his commitment to swimming and squash (apparently Keith in his time was a top squash player). There were also 5 mates from his University days (circa 1968) in Sydney who recounted a classic tale of how Keith purchased a Motor Scooter called a "Rabbit". Keith was standing next to the scooter proudly showing his mates how it worked, when he twisted the handle (accelerator) and it took off, with Keith madly running with it holding on by one hand, heading for a plate glass window. Somehow, Keith performed a "superman" stunt and threw himself onto the scooter, and managed to do a wheelie and stop the running with the plate glass window. Ah the memories!

Another speaker was the current President of the Association of Public Authority Surveyors (APAS), who announced that at their AGM (co-incidentally held in Bathurst on the same week as the Memorial service), it had been agreed to introduce an award called "The Keith Haddon Memorial Award" to be presented to the surveyor who produced the best "papers" at their annual AGM. A great honour indeed in recognition of the efforts made by Keith as one of the founding members of that organisation.

Wife, Liz flanked with their 3 adult children, made a lovely speech on behalf of the family. Keith and Liz were married for 42 years after their wedding in January 1969. Liz recalled how Keith was mad on computers (his first computer was of course the legendary Commodore 64), and his love of Spreadsheets was evident at every organisation in which he served – even at home he had spreadsheets for Car Mileage, Finances, Assets – you name it, Keith had a Spreadsheet for it. Even the night before he passed away, Keith had his treasured laptop on his hospital bed.

A truly inspirational memorial service and one which left the guests very thankful for Keith's contribution to our lives. Liz expressed her sincere appreciation to all those who have sent their condolences, and was just overwhelmed at the number of people who attended the memorial service. Rest in Peace Keith Haddon – you will be sadly missed by those who have known you.

Registrations will soon be opening for the 2012 Fraser Coast "Bush 'n Beach" Rort hosted by the Hervey Bay & Maryborough Apex 40 Clubs

In March 2009 the councils of Hervey Bay, Maryborough, Tiaro and Woocoo amalgamated to become the new Fraser Coast Regional Council. The local authority area has a population in excess of 92,000 and is one of the fastest growing areas in Australia.

The Fraser Coast is so named as it lies in the lee of Fraser Island an island located along the southern coast of Queensland, Australia, approximately 300 kilometres north of Brisbane. Its length is about 120 kilometres. It was inscribed as a World Heritage site in 1992. The island is considered to be the largest sand island in the world at 1840 km² & has its own subtropical rainforest.

According to Aboriginal legend, when humans were created and needed a place to live, the mighty god Beiral sent his messenger Yendingie with the goddess K'gari down from heaven to create the land and mountains, rivers and sea. K'gari fell in love with the earth's beauty and did not want to leave it. So Yendingie changed her into a heavenly island – Fraser Island.

The name Fraser Island comes from Eliza Fraser and her story of survival from a shipwreck on the island. Captain James Fraser and his wife, Eliza Fraser, were shipwrecked on the island in 1836. The name of the ship was the Stirling Castle. Captain Fraser died but Eliza was rescued off the island.

Hervey Bay has often been called the jewel in Queensland's crown. It is also referred to as the Whale Watch Capital of the World. A scenic 3 ½ hours drive north of Brisbane and only 45 minutes by air from Brisbane, Hervey Bay is an easily accessible holiday destination.

The city has a wonderful subtropical climate. Temperatures range from 14 to 23 degrees Centigrade in winter and 22 to 29 degrees Centigrade in summer. A great place to escape the southern winter. Rainfall is low and there are more fine days than other Queensland holiday centres.

Hervey Bay is well-known for its calm waters, superb fishing and whale watching, excellent areas for sailing and water sports, growing population and laidback lifestyle. "The Bay" as it is fondly termed by residents is also referred to as the "Whale City" which makes nearby neighbour Maryborough the "Heritage City". Just 30kms from the beachside cafes of Hervey Bay, you'll find the charming and historic city of Maryborough built on the banks of the grand Mary River.

Maryborough was settled in 1847 and is one of Queensland's oldest provincial cities. The new Maryborough township quickly became a thriving, bustling river port for the export of wool, cotton, timber, sugar - and then gold. In the lead-up to Federation, it was the second largest immigration port after Sydney - with up to 22,000 free settlers landing in Maryborough seeking fame and fortune in the new colony.

In the 1800s, ships from Plymouth and Liverpool were docking almost every two weeks bringing immigrants from England, Scotland, Ireland, Germany and Scandinavia. The many grand old heritage listed buildings and hotels in the Portside area were built to service the Port of Maryborough's thriving merchant businesses

At one stage Maryborough was the rival for Brisbane as the new Queensland capital.


KELAB APEX 40 — Kuala Lumpur - 3654km North West of Darwin
