An article (below) from the Apexian dated October 1974

APEX OVER 40 IS

A SOCIAL organisation known as "Apex 40" has been formed to maintain contact between retired Apexians.

Apex 40 is basically a fellowship organisation for the enjoyment of members and their families.

Its purpose is to provide the means for retired Apexians to keep alive the friendships made during their Apex years and of course to provide the opportunity for making new friendships.

All Apex 40 activities are family functions and there is no obligation on any member to attend.

Emblem

The official emblem is recognisable immediately by all Apexians.

It is a triangle with the word "Apex" above a line with "40" underneath meaning "Apex over 40."

Persons eligible for membership of Apex 40

- An Apexian on retirement from active membership at normal retiring age.
- An Apexian promoted to a Life office.

 Any ex-Apexian as approved by the Apex 40 committee.

 Wives of eligible members.

Apex 40 is financed by an annual membership subscription, at present \$2.

Dinners

Dinner meetings are held bi-monthly as follows—

February, 1st Monday April, 1st Wednesday June, 1st Friday August, 1st Monday October, 1st Wednesday December, 1st Friday.

Dinner meeting may either be a dinner and a chat, dinner dance, or a guest speaker.

Social activities are normally held on the other months during the year, namely March, May, July, September and November.

An annual reunion will be held each year in conjunction with a zone con-

Apex 40 members will participate in zone functions as well holding separate Apex 40 activities. organisation for retired Apexians was first conceived on a boat trip on the Swan River during the Scarborough Association Convention, Easter 1972.

Two members shortly due to retire from active membership. Lionel Mussell and Neil Hookey, felt if would be a pity to lose contact with fellow Apexians.

The idea remained dormant until the following year when, at the Maryborough Association Convention, delegates voted from the constitution restrictions on auxiliary and affiliated bodies.

Zone 12 VP David Cotton and Lionel Mussell rehatched the idea of an affiliated body for retired Apexians and Lionel Mussell agreed to investigate further this idea.

Subsequently a group of ex-Apexians and their families were called to consider the idea over a family barbecue.

Informal

Because so many friendships just stop when Apexians reach re-tiring age, this group considered that it would be a good idea if some form of an informal association could be established for retired Apexians for the purpose of maintaining the friendships made in Apex.

An interim committee was formed comprising Lionel Mussell (Mornington), Neil Hookey (Camberwell), Alan Padgham (Baywater), David Saunders (Malvern) and Kevin Frazer (Nunawading) to investigate the feasibility of the establishment of an association.

In the first nine months financial membership reached 74 members comprising 46 retired Apexians and 26 wives.

As the word has spread new names have been regularly added to the mailing list.



We want to welcome you to Geelong, on this the 40th anniversary

of the first Rort that was held in Ballarat. Geelong as you would be aware, was the home of Apex, which is the very reason for us celebrating this weekend.

Geelong's name originates from the Aboriginal word Jillong', meaning a place of the sea bird over white cliffs'. The city takes full advantage of its prime position on the shores of the north-facing Corio Bay.

Geelong is Victoria's second largest city and within a short drive from popular beach-front communities on The Bellarine, as well as being the gateway to the famous Great Ocean Road, which begins just south of Geelong at Torquay.

The city itself boasts a large commercial centre which extends down to the foreshore, offering visitors the chance to explore popular waterfront attractions such as the unique art deco Eastern Beach sea-bathing complex, a fully restored historic carousel, Steampacket Gardens and several coastal walks dotted with collections of bollards depicting historic characters. Elegant architecture, colourful gardens and parks, and the backdrop of Corio Bay are all symbolic of what locals refer to as the "city by the bay".

Geelong's central city and suburbs offer excellent shopping facilities, restaurants, nightlife and recreation on a par with any capital city. Locations of interest for visitors include the National Wool Museum, the Old Geelong Gaol, the Botanic Gardens at Eastern Park and a number of other museums, galleries and historical buildings. The Barwon River meanders through Geelong and its surrounding suburbs, fronted by a number of attractive parks and the scenic Buckley Falls in Fyansford.

And there's plenty to see and do in the surrounding areas. Queenscliff, a short drive away on The Bellarine, is a delightful historic seaside village. You'll be inspired by its architecture, ranging from fishermen's cottages to grand Victorian-era hotels.
