


International Relations and Apex Liaison Report: Mark Carter (Joanne) Leeton

Treasurer's Report and Fee recommendation:

Darrol Harmer (Sandy) Wyong

The organisation's financial year ends on the 31st March. As soon as practical thereafter, annual accounts shall be prepared and lodged with the Queensland ASIC/Fair Trading body.

Some points to arise from the financial report are:-

- Surplus for the 11 months is \$3,069
- Annual membership fees are still being received for banking March or later.
- 2017 Rort registration fees received of \$59,630 is considered adequate to meet all expected Rort expenditure.
- Separate to the "Rort accounts" the working operating and investment accounts exceed \$30,000 which provides the organisation with a *significantly large* "cash reserve".

At the 2016 Rort, annual membership fees were set at \$7.50 per head. Having reviewed actual 2016/17 expenses, estimated next year expenses and available cash reserves, I recommend that annual fees remain unchanged at \$7.50 per member.

Monday already; The 2017 A-40 PRT left motored off, spot on time. The Rorters were farewelled. The Pioneer Village Breakfast came to a close and another adventure began. A short trip to the New England Woodturning Supplies at Gilgai, for the first of many and varied smokos. A browse through the wares, a didgi playing demonstration by Rob, some purchases, and the first wares were logged and loaded.

With a healthy start in mind, the next excursion was a guided farm tour to see Free-Range Chickens & Pigs. Guyra's own Fiona led the tour and our very own Peter from Grafton demonstrated his prowess in chook whispering, leaving a behind trail of sleeping chickens. Suddenly the gods were aroused, the weather put on a threatening face so the security of the coach was sought. With hurried thankyou's and goodbyes Phil headed for firmer ground at the Costa Glass House Farm. The taste buds were again satiated when gourmet food and fellowship was enjoyed at Rafters Guyra Restaurant. Ex sheepman and shearer, now trout farmer, Deano, showed us the ropes; the amateurs were given the opportunity to feed a pond of hungry trout, view thousands of yabbies growing fat and partake of a delicious smoked trout dip. Not that anyone was really hungry, but what the heck! There is always room for a delicacy.

On to Glen Innes, the Celtic capital of Australia. Fred, the world's only caber tossing, indigenous Scotsman joined the coach for a tour and explanation of the Australian Standing Stones. His enthusiasm was infectious and he had all wanting to stay for the upcoming festival. Fred joined us for dinner at the motel and relayed some tall stories and true.

Onwards to what was expected to be sleepy Tenterfield. Down the hill at the School of Arts, it was explained why Sir Henry Parkes and Tenterfield played an important part in the history Australian Federation. After an informative guided tour of the Sir Henry Parkes Museum, followed by a well-presented doco on Tenterfield in the theatre, and of course another sumptuous luncheon.

Back on the coach, a Tenterfield and surrounds hysterical tour was hosted by ex-Apexian Terry. Les and Terry were teenage mates (and still are) and with others, misspent their youth carrying out practical jokes on the hapless and innocent. The Barrel Room is where Ballandean estates Winery keep their fine aged Ports and Muscat's in 1,000 gallon oak barrels and the room has a beautiful aged in oak aroma. A very profitable fines session, hosted by sergeant's Peter and Brian was held after dinner at the Barrel Room. Michael was pleasantly surprised with a birthday cake and trimmings.

With the promise of an easy last day the party left Stanthorpe heading in a westerly direction. Just past the locality of Nundubber, and the impressive waterfall, the tour visited Casley Mount Hutton Winery at Greenlands. The tour's final tasting and winery tour. The winemaker seemed extremely happy with the frenzy of final purchases.

Continuing on to the west a walk around the border town of Texas on the Dumaresq (pronounced Due-Merrick) was offered. A final great country style lunch at the well renowned Stockman's Hotel again satiated all appetites. 'All Aboard' was announced after lunch for the final leg. 
One couple locked their key in their room so requested the spare on to get in, then brought one of the keys with them when we left town.

One of the Sergeants-at-arms on our last night out told a story and of course fined someone for being involved. Only problem was, he told the same one the previous year!








