Membership of Apex 40 Australia Inc. stands at just over 700 with three more sub-committees yet to pay. This puts us on target for 750 plus this year.



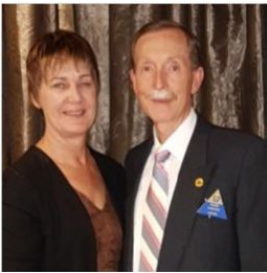
**Past President's Annual Report:

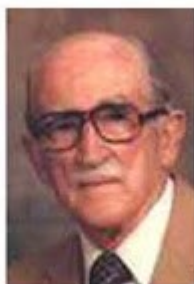

## **APEX 40 Tour to SOUTH AFRICA as Guests of RT41 SA, September 2018**

We have been invited to participate in the above tour by our kindred association in South Africa. As with many organisations world-wide, their membership has dwindled, but they have done their best to ensure we have a wonderful visit to their country and enjoy the friendship and fellowship with their members, that this type of tour generates.

The tour will commence on August 31 when we fly from Australia to Johannesburg, South Africa, where we will be met at the airport and collected by our 36-seat air-conditioned coach and driver, for the first leg of our journey from Johannesburg to Durban, from where we will fly to Port Elizabeth. The second leg of the journey will take us along the coastal Garden Route from Port Elizabeth to Cape Town, on a similar coach.

There will be 14 nights of hotel accommodation as per the below itinerary, taking in the RT41SA AGM in Richards Bay, and seven nights of home hosting by members of RT41SA in their homes. In addition, we will be joined by their members at evening functions along the way.

### Wednesday

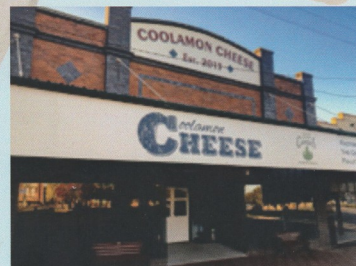
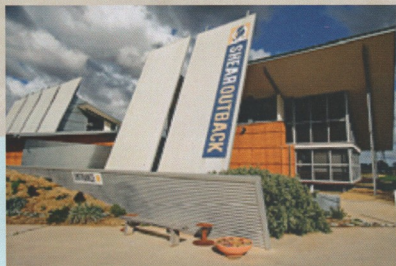

### Travel Choices - Air

Leeton/Narrandera Airport is our preferred airport which is serviced by Regional Express Airlines (REX) with 3 flights a day out of Sydney only. The RORT committee will provide complimentary transfers for each flight. As there are limited cheap fares on each flight, it is suggested that you book as early as possible.

### Travel Choices - Road

Leeton is located in the Riverina area of Southern NSW.  
From Sydney it is 560km or about 6hrs. From Brisbane it is 1250km or about 14hrs via the Nowell Hwy.  
From Melbourne it is 461km or just over 5hrs.
