

Apex 40 Australia Inc. is not a Service Club, but an organisation formed to foster fellowship among past Apexians and their partners, and to retain the many friendships formed during their Apex years.

It also exists to assist Apex, when asked, and not to operate in opposition to Apex. It is open to past members and their partners, and also Ex-World Councilors who have retired from their respective organisations.

The Ideals of Apex were to provide a means of forming enduring friendships. So, do you remember the great friendships and fellowship you experienced as a member or partner of an Apex member? Why not continue those friendships and join Apex 40.

Some Apex 40 members decided to form sub-committees which are generally based around past or present Apex Club locations. These sub-committees may meet monthly or less regularly, but all with a view to maintaining and fostering friendships, and occasionally providing assistance to Apex Clubs.

Each year members from Apex 40 gather for a weekend to attend the Annual Convention known as 'The Rort'. During this weekend there is a brief interruption to the festivities to conduct the necessary formality of The Annual General Meeting. After the weekend is over the RORT is followed by Post-RORT tour which is a 4 or 5 day itinerary covering visits to areas surrounding the town hosting The Rort.

The socialising of individual members with each other, across the whole organisation, never ceases. When on an interstate holiday, for example, members invariably look up acquaintances and friends made during the Rorts. It is a huge social club, and fosters friendships between whole families.

There are currently about 35 active sub-committees, some with memberships in excess of 40, plus 14 'Members-at-large'. Members at Large are active members of Apex 40, living or travelling in areas where there is no Apex 40 sub-committees, or find it not practical to join an existing sub-committee, but still participate in our activities.

Membership is open to all past members of Apex, their partners and members of affiliated clubs.

41 Club GB & I, Apex 40 South Africa 2019 Trip

The tour commenced in Cape Town on the 5th of September at the Lord Charles Hotel, the venue for the 41 Club Conference. Our tour group met in St Andrews Bar for Happy Hour, where we received our tour shirts and met up with fellow Aussies, members from U.K. and South Africa. Dinner venue was the Cattle Baron which is famous for its steaks.

The following day was spent on Robben Island where we had a 3 1/2 hour history tour of the island and toured the prison where Mandela was held. We made it back in time for Happy Hour at St Andrews Bar prior to boarding the shuttle to Somerset West Club 31, RT41 Club House for a lamb roast. The dress up theme was World Rugby.

7 September was a full day of the AGM where the ladies joined in until 10.30 when they departed for Lourensford Wine Estate for a wine and chocolate tasting which was followed by a lovely lunch. We were privileged to go to the Presidents Cocktail Party prior to the Gala Night, Presidents Banquet which was held at the Lord Charles Ballroom.

Saw some beautiful flowers on the Western Coast drive to our Farmhouse Hotel in Langebaan where we stayed for 2 nights. The following day we went to the lower Berg River, Velddrif and Bookom where we saw how they dried fish (mullet) and in the distance saw thousands of beautiful flamingos. Had a walk around Port Owen Marina and then off to Voorstrandt Restaurant by the sea, for lunch and a bottle of wine before returning to the Farmhouse Hotel. Somerset 41 Club hosted an evening meal (Braai) BBQ for us at the Langebaan Yacht Club which was a very short walk from our accommodation.

After breakfast we headed off the Allesverloven Winery and arrived at Aquila Safari and Spa in time for lunch and settle into our rooms. We had a 3 hour evening safari where we saw elephants, zebras, wildebeest, antelope, lions, ostrich, rhinos, elands, springbok and baboons. Next morning we were all booked in for an early morning safari. Although 5 of our group didn't make it and decided to have a sleep in. We were treated to great interaction between the giraffes, the wildebeest and the elephants. On our way to tonight's Leipzig Country House and Winery accommodation we went to Karoo Botanical Gardens where we spent some time walking around the gardens. This evening we were treated to another Braai this time it was hosted by the Worcester 68, 41 Club which was followed by shots and a singalong. The President's wife Adelle gave us books on saving Rhinos which was most informative.

Woke to a cooler 13 degrees with showers. Went to Willow Creek Olive Estate, in Nuy Valley, famous for Olive products, vinegar products and of course wines. Lunch was at Saggy Stone where craft beers were a speciality. The evening meal was at Leipzig Restaurant where we had the venue to ourselves for an elaborate dinner.

The next morning we drove along Route 62 which is the longest wine producing route in South Africa. Stopped and had a milk shake at Diesel and Cream (best ever). We called into Ronnie's Sex shop — not what you expect. We presented Ronnie with a pair signed undies, a Club 41 shirt, banners and business cards to add to his collection of wall to ceiling memorabilia. Tonight's accommodation was at The Queens, in Calitzdorp which is like a home away from home. A few of us walked to Boplass Winery and saw Ann, the singer we met last year. We dined at Karooboom Restaurant which was suggested by another 41 club member.

Drove along the Wilderness Route, Route 62 and stopped to enjoy a tour of an ostrich farm where we even saw a white ostrich. Then onto our accommodation at the Marriott at King George which overlooks a golf course. Our evening meal was hosted by the George 41 Club. First course was liver minced up, shaped & called tortoise followed by sausage, Kudu kebab and lamb and then ice-cream. We danced the night away.

The next day saw us in Knysna where we had a community tour of shanty town. Went to a church service and then onto Ella's house for morning tea and lunch. Ella has taken in 17 children, now ranging from 2 to 24 years of age, who have been mistreated and she has given them a home and ensured they receive an education. At 5pm we commenced our Sundowner cruise, which was very calm and we witnessed a great sunset.

We had a free morning so a few of the boys managed to get a game of golf while Albert our trusty driver took us to a laundromat. We toured the Outeniqua Railway Museum then had a train ride to Groot Brakrivier, where we lunched at OpiSpoor Pub and Grill. It was another way to view the countryside. The evening meal was at the Marriott. The following day we spent the morning at Bartolomeu Dias Museum at Mossel Bay and then lunched at Jackal on the Beach Eatery with Shirley Huxham, a friend of Kevin and Liz Huxham and the tour group. Drove onto Swellendam and stayed at Aan De Oever accommodation for one night. The evening meal was hosted by Swellendam Round Table and 41 Club members and consisted of a huge Braai.

The following morning saw 3 of our members enjoy a game of golf while the rest of us had an opportunity to explore the town with its historical buildings. Had a beautiful a la carte lunch, overlooking a stream, at La Belle Alliance Restaurant. Our accommodation was on the waterfront at Arniston Spa Hotel with complimentary wine and sherry in our room. We had a 2 course meal in the hotel's restaurant.

Next morning drove to Cape Agulhas where the Indian Ocean meets the Atlantic Ocean which is the most southerly point in South Africa. Walked around the foreshore and some of our group went into the lighthouse. Went onto the Black Oyster Catcher Winery and Restaurant for lunch where some of our group had the opportunity to do a craft beer sampling. Our night's accommodation was at The Windsor Lodge at Hermanus where we failed to see any whales as it was too cold. Apparently the whale festival was about 5 days later and the whales turned up in time for that. This evening's meal was hosted by Paarl 41'ers at their Club House. We had sausages and snook (a very special large fish) with lots of salads and bread with apricot jam.

The next day headed to Stellenbosch for 4 nights before we fly home. At Stony Point we were able to get very close by walking along the allocated paths to the Seabird Breeding Colony (mainly penguins) to get a better viewing. We had an excellent seafood lunch at the Ocean Basket Restaurant. Drove onto the Cheetah Encounter Experience where we were able to pat a cheetah. Arrived at De Zalze Lodge accommodation which has its own winery and golf course and dined at the lodge's restaurant.

As Table Mountain was closed due to predicted rain, we headed to The Huguenot Monument, then had time to go to the markets and walk around the town. Our next stop was Franschhoek Motor Museum which interested most of the men. The ladies opted to sit in the lounge, sip wine and catch up emails from home. As it was raining, we stayed and had lunch in the museum café. Drove onto Delheim Estate Wines and had an official wine tasting and education on wines, as if we needed it. The evening meal was at a Spanish Restaurant.
